Preface

This publication has been prepared by the Sentencing Statistics and NOMS Projections section of RDS NOMS (Research Development and Statistics – National Offender Management Service). It contains key statistics describing the sentencing of offenders in England and Wales. It is available as an online publication via the Ministry of Justice website at: http://www.justice.gov.uk/publications/statistics.htm. Detailed statistics related to this publication appear in the supplementary volumes of Criminal Statistics England and Wales also available at the Ministry of Justice site. A summary description of what is included in these volumes appears in Appendix 6.

Data sources and quality

This data has been extracted and supplied to the Ministry of Justice by the courts and police forces from a variety of administrative data systems. Every effort is made to ensure that the figures presented in this publication are accurate and complete. Although care is taken in collating and analysing the returns used to compile these figures, the data are of necessity subject to the inaccuracies inherent in any large-scale recording system. Consequently, although figures are shown to the last digit in order to provide a comprehensive record of the information collected, they are not necessarily accurate to the last digit shown.

Significant changes in this edition

Breaches: The publication of breach statistics has been withdrawn from this edition. Data quality checks have shown large variations in the provision of breach data from the police forces and the courts, rendering the data unsuitable for publication. Statistics on breaches will not be published until significant improvements have been made to the submissions of this data to the Ministry of Justice.

Criminal histories: The Ministry of Justice is currently conducting a review of the data and methods used to compile figures on the criminal histories of offenders who have been sentenced. Chapter 6 is therefore not currently available. It is hoped that this chapter will be published on the Ministry's website early in 2008, with figures for 2006 and revised figures for earlier years.

National sentencing trends (Chapter 1)

- The total number of offenders sentenced in 2006 was 1,420,600. This is a reduction of four per cent from 2005 and a decrease of one per cent compared with 1996. There was a reduction of one per cent to 302,500 in the numbers sentenced for *indictable* (including triable-either-way) offences. Theft and handling stolen goods and indictable motoring offences recorded the lowest numbers sentenced in a decade.
- The Criminal Justice Act 2003 made major changes to the sentencing framework to make it clearer and more flexible. Some changes to sentencing patterns of note in 2006 included:
 - a) The various kinds of community sentences for adults were replaced by a single 'Community Order' with a range of possible requirements.
 - b) Increasing numbers of serious violent and sexual offenders were given new sentences (Indeterminate or Extended Public Protection sentences), which ensure that they are kept in prison or under supervision for longer periods than previously.
 - c) An increase in Suspended Sentence Orders were seen.

Custodial sentences (Chapter 2)

- The total number of offenders sentenced to immediate custody increased by 13 per cent from 85,200 in 1996 to 96,000 in 2006. Between 2005 and 2006 custodial sentences at magistrates' courts decreased by 3,800 (7%) to 53,400 and at the Crown Court they decreased by 1,400 (3%) to 42,600.
- For indictable offences at all courts, the number of offenders sentenced to immediate custody decreased by four per cent from 76,300 in 2005 to 73,500 in 2006. Twenty four per cent of offenders sentenced for indictable offences in 2006, attracted a custodial sentence. Custody rates decreased in both the Crown Court and magistrates' courts in 2006. In the Crown Court, the custody rate for indictable offences dropped from 60 per cent in 2005 to 57 per cent in 2006; in magistrates' courts, there was a very small decrease and the overall figure stayed around 14 per cent.
- The average custodial sentence lengths for indictable offences at the Crown Court¹ increased from 22.4 months in 1996 to 25.2 months in 2006. However, this was a decrease from 25.9 months in 2005. In magistrates' courts during this period, they remained at between 2.7 months and 3.0 months.
- The suspended sentence order (SSO) was introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003 for offences committed from April 2005 and replaced the fully suspended sentence (FSS). The number of offenders who received suspended sentences at all courts in

Offenders receiving an indeterminate sentence of imprisonment for public protection for a serious offence would previously have received a lengthy determinate sentence that would have been included in the calculation of average custodial sentence length. These longer sentences are now effectively excluded from the calculation. This may account for the observed decrease in average custodial sentence lengths since 2004/2005.

2006 increased more than three fold (245%) since 2005, from 9,700 to 33,500. A higher proportion of offenders were sentenced to suspended sentences at the Crown Court.

Community sentences (Chapter 3)

- The total number of community sentences has seen a steady increase between 1996 and 2006 with the number increasing by 44 per cent from 132,600 to 190,800 during this period. Between 2005 and 2006, the rate of community sentences at the Crown Court fell from 30 per cent to 23 per cent; however, the rate at magistrates' courts remained stable at 13 per cent.
- The number of offenders given community sentences for *indictable* offences fell between 2005 and 2006 from 111,700 to 103,000. This represented 34 per cent of the total number of offenders sentenced for *indictable* offences in 2006, compared with 37 per cent in 2005.
- All the old types of community sentence applicable to adults declined in number indictable offences in 2005 with the introduction of the community order from April 2005. The community order in 2006 accounts for 92 per cent of the community sentences given to adults.

Fines and other disposals (Chapter 4)

- The number of offenders fined for *all* offences dropped from 1,073,000 in 1996 to 961,500 in 2006, a decrease of ten per cent.
- Both the magistrates' courts and the Crown Court recorded the lowest figure for the number of offenders fined for *indictable* offences during the last decade at 50,100 and 1,600 respectively in 2006. The proportion of offenders fined for indictable offences declined at magistrates' courts from 36 per cent to 22 per cent and at the Crown Court from four per cent to two per cent between 1996 and 2006.
- Over the last decade, summary motoring offences have produced the highest volume of fines in magistrates' courts. The number of fines in this category has decreased by six per cent, from 590,500 in 2005 to 553,200 in 2006.

Regional trends (Chapter 5)

The numbers sentenced for all offences at all courts decreased across most criminal justice areas. Merseyside had the highest custody rate of nine per cent while Lincolnshire had the lowest custody rate of three per cent. The largest drop in average custodial sentence length for all offences over the last ten years was for West Mercia from 14.7 months in 1996 to 10.7 months in 2006. The greatest increase was for Warwickshire, which increased from 13.0 to 15.7 months.

1. National sentencing trends and key criminal justice system statistics, 1996–2006

Introduction

1.1 This chapter highlights some of the key national statistics for 2006. It includes statistics published elsewhere (see references) and gives selected long-term trends.

Changes in crime in England and Wales

- 1.2 The crime statistics presented in this chapter relate to the financial year 2006/07. The British Crime Survey¹ (BCS) shows that crime is stabilising after falling for long periods. Based on BCS interviews in 2006/07, it is estimated that there were approximately 11.3 million crimes against adults living in private households.
- 1.3 Since peaking in 2003/04, BCS crime has fallen by 42 per cent, representing 8.0 million fewer crimes, with domestic burglary and all vehicle thefts falling by over a half (59% and 61%, respectively) and violent crime falling by 41 per cent during this period. On the recorded crime side, both domestic burglary and theft of and from vehicles have continued to fall over the same period.
- 1.4 Crimes recorded by the police in 2006/07 decreased by two per cent to 5.4 million. This is the third consecutive fall in police recorded crime.
- 1.5 The rate of victims' reporting of crimes to the police has remained broadly stable since 1997, whereas the rate of recording of crimes by the police has been increasing, especially in the last three years, largely as a result of the nationwide introduction of the National Crime Recording Standard (NCRS).
- 1.6 For the crime types it covers, the BCS better reflects the true extent of crime because it includes crimes that are not reported to the police. The BCS count also gives a better indication of trends in crime over time because it is unaffected by

- changes in levels of reporting to the police, and in police recording practices. However, only crimes recorded by the police are likely to result in criminal court proceedings.
- 1.7 Police statistics provide a good measure of trends in well-reported crimes. They are an important indicator of police workload, and can be used to analyse local crime patterns. Note that the trends in recorded crime have been affected by changes to the counting rules in April 1998 and in the way the police record crimes following the introduction nationally of the NCRS in April 2002.

Public perception (from the BCS)

1.8 Despite the number of crimes estimated by the BCS falling in recent years, comparatively high numbers of people still believe the crime rate has risen. People have more positive perceptions of crime in their own area than nationally; 65 per cent of people thought that crime in the country as a whole had increased compared with 41 per cent who thought crime in their local area had increased.

Changes in numbers dealt with by the Criminal Justice System

- 1.9 Changes in the numbers of people processed through the criminal justice system can be influenced by factors unrelated to the underlying levels of crimes and the numbers of crimes detected. The flows through the criminal justice system are illustrated in Figure 1.1. A more detailed description of the procedures is given in Appendix 1.
- 1.10 The number of people cautioned rose in 2006 to 350,000. This continues the pattern of increases since 2003, after reductions in 2001 and 2002. The increase from 2005 to 2006 was 17 per cent (Table 1.1), the same as the percentage increase from 2004 to 2005. Cautions are discussed more fully in Criminal statistics England and Wales 2006². The introduction of Penalty Notices for Disorder (PNDs) in 2004 may have affected the numbers of people who would otherwise have been cautioned or proceeded against in court.
- 1.11 The total number of offenders sentenced in 2006, 1,420,600, was a reduction of four per cent over 2005 and a decrease of one per cent compared with 1996. The reductions between 2005 and 2006 were in both summary and triable-either-way indictable offences, especially summary motoring offences which decreased by seven per cent or 44,600 (Table 1.1). Most offence groups showed reductions consistent with the reduction for the total. However, there were small increases in most indictable offences, although theft and handling stolen goods and indictable motoring offences both recorded the lowest numbers sentenced in a decade.
- 1.12 The number sentenced for indictable offences (including triable-either-way offences) was 302,500, down 4,100 or one per cent from 2005. This continues the downward trend seen since 2002. The proportion of all offenders sentenced for indictable offences has risen to two percent. The numbers committed for trial and for sentence to the Crown Court from the magistrates' courts both decreased (2% or 1,400 and 3% or 500, respectively), and the number sentenced at the Crown Court increased by one per cent or 800 (Table 1.1).

Numbers in brackets indicate figures for indictable offences³. Note that the average custodial sentence length (ACSL) for indictable offences at magistrates' courts is lower than that for all offences. The difference is small and historically these two average sentence lengths have been very close. Also, the ACSL excludes persons sentenced to life or indeterminate sentences.

Suspended Sentence Orders are included in the 'Other disposal' category.

Overview of sentencing disposals

Immediate custodial sentences (all courts)

- 1.13 The annual figure for the total number of offenders receiving immediate custodial sentences decreased from 101,200 in 2005 to 96,000 in 2006. This is a five per cent reduction and continues the year-by-year reductions seen since 2002. The number of community sentences decreased by seven per cent, and the number of fines reduced by six per cent; other disposals also reduced by 3 per cent (Table 1.2).
- 1.14 The overall Average Custodial Sentence Length⁴ (ACSL) decreased by two per cent in 2006 to 12.4 months (shown in Table 1.2). However, for individual offence groups, the changes in ACSLs were not consistent. There were increases in ACSL for:
 - Fraud and forgery⁵; and
 - indictable motoring offences⁵.
- 1.15 There were decreases in ACSL for:
 - violence against the person⁵;
 - sexual offences⁵;
 - burglary⁵;
 - robbery⁵;
 - criminal damage⁵;
 - drug offences⁵; and
 - other indictable (excl. motoring offences)⁵
- 1.16 Other ACSLs were essentially unchanged (less than ±1% change).
- 1.17 The ACSLs for 1996, 2001 and 2006 are shown in Figure 1.2 (for the Crown Court). For most offence groups, 2006 has the highest ACSL. However, it can be misleading to infer a long-term trend from only three data points. More detail about custodial sentences is available in Chapter 2.


Non-custodial sentences (all courts)

- 1.18 The total number of community sentences imposed (all courts, all offences) decreased by seven per cent. This is a reverse from the trend in 2005, and a possible impact of Suspended Sentence Orders (see paragraph 1.21). The total number of fines has varied considerably over the past ten years. In 2006, there was a six per cent decrease in the number of fines at all courts.
- 1.19 More information about non-custodial sentences can be found in Chapter 3 (community sentences) and Chapter 4 (fines and other sentences).

⁴ The average custodial sentence length is calculated for all determinate custodial sentences. Indeterminate sentences, such as life sentences and the growing number of imprisonment for public protection sentences (introduced in April 2005 under the Criminal Justice Act 2003) cannot be included, as the length of the sentence is not known. Offenders receiving an indeterminate sentence for public protection for a serious offence would previously have received a lengthy determinate sentence that would have been included in the calculation of average custodial sentence length. These longer sentences are now excluded from the calculation. This may result in a reduction in average custodial sentence lengths.

1.20 The total number of offenders sentenced at magistrates' courts in 2006 was 1,344,000 (Table 1.3) while for the Crown Court it was 76,600 (Table 1.4). These are a reduction of four per cent and an increase of one per cent respectively on 2005. The total number of male offenders sentenced at all courts was 1,135,200 (a decrease of 5% on 2005), which was 80 per cent of all persons sentenced. The total number of female offenders sentenced was 277,700 (a decrease of 2% on 2005), which was 20 per cent of all persons sentenced. The total number of juveniles (aged 10–17) sentenced was 93,800 (7% of all persons sentenced) while for young adults (aged 18–20) and adults (aged 21 and over) the numbers were 142,700 (a decrease of 2% on 2005, or 10% of all persons sentenced) and 1,176,400 (a decrease of 4% on 2005, or 83% of all persons sentenced) respectively. There were 7,600 (1% of the total) sentences passed on companies, organisations, etc.

Sentences for indictable offences





Figure 1.4: Disposals at Crown Courts (indictable offences), 1996–2006

1.21 For indictable offences (including triable-either-way offences), immediate custodial sentences reduced by four per cent, from 76,300 in 2005 to 73,500 in 2006 at all courts. The proportion of offenders given immediate custody fell slightly to 24 per cent in 2006 (this has hardly changed since 2000). Community sentences for indictable offences were 111,700 in 2005 and 103,000 in 2006, the proportion of offenders given community sentences decreased from 36 per cent to 34 per cent. Fines for indictable offences continued the decrease seen from 2003 going from 58,400 in 2005 to 51,600 in 2006, and the proportion of offenders given fines reduced from 19 per cent to 17 per cent. Suspended sentences increased 270 per cent, from 5,600 in 2005 to 20,800 in 2006. Other disposals for indictable offences fell from their 2005 levels (54,500 in 2005 to 53,600 in 2006). The proportion of each type of disposal for indictable offences is shown in Figure 1.3 (for magistrates' courts) and Figure 1.4 (for the Crown Court).

Figure 1.3: Disposals at the magistrates' courts (indictable offences), 1996–2006

New penalties and sentences

1.22 The Criminal Justice Act 2003 made the sentencing framework clearer and more flexible than before by introducing changes to the sentences available to the courts for offences committed on or after 4th April 2005:


- a) The various kinds of community sentences for adults were replaced by a single Community Order with a range of possible requirements.
- b) New sentences of Indeterminate or Extended Public Protection were made available for serious violent and sexual offenders, to ensure that they are kept in prison or under supervision for longer periods than previously.
- c) Custodial sentences of 12 months and over are served in full, with half in custody, half in the community and with supervision extended to the end of the sentence rather than the 3/4 point as previously.
- d) A reformed suspended sentence (Suspended Sentence Order) in which offenders have to complete a range of requirements imposed by the court was introduced.
- 1.23 More information may be found in Appendix 2.

The impact of sentencing on prison and probation services

- 1.24 Between 2005 and 2006, the total numbers proceeded against decreased by six per cent; those proceeded against for indictable offences decreased by four per cent, for summary non-motoring offences decreased by four per cent and for summary motoring offences decreased by nine per cent. The total number sentenced at all courts also decreased by four per cent.
- 1.25 This indicates that there has been a general decrease in the numbers proceeded against and the number found guilty and sentenced in 2006 compared with 2005. There has been an increase in the use of custody and community sentences for summary non-motoring offences, which more than offset by a decrease for these types of disposal for summary motoring offences.
- 1.26 Figures 1.2, 1.3 and 1.4 illustrate the tendency for an increased use of custody over time. The number sentenced to custody at magistrates' courts for indictable offences dropped from 33,200 in 2005 to 31,900 in 2006 (Table 1.3). However, this has been caused by a drop in the number sentenced for indictable offences: the custody rate remained unchanged at 14 percent in 2006. The numbers sentenced to custody for summary offences (motoring and non-motoring) have decreased, but custody rates are unchanged. This (and other effects such as changes in sentence lengths) is reflected in a long-term increasing trend in the custodial population. Apart from the period 1999 to 2001, when the population was stable, there has been a sustained increasing trend. (See Figure 1.5.)
- 1.27 The number of offenders being supervised by the Probation Service under a court order increased by six per cent between 2005 and 2006, to reach 146,530 in December 2006. This represents an increase of 33 per cent from 1996. The number of offenders under pre or post-release supervision also increased between 1996 and 2006. Some 90,740 people were under such supervision in December 2006, representing an increase of 44 per cent on 1996. The increase from 2005 to 2006 was one per cent. Further information is available from Offender Management Caseload Statistics 2006⁶.

- The total number of offenders sentenced to immediate custody increased by 13 per cent from 85,200 in 1996 to 96,000 in 2006. Between 2005 and 2006 custodial sentences at magistrates' courts decreased by 3,800 (7%) to 53,400 and at the Crown Court they decreased by 1,400 (3%) to 42,600.
- For indictable offences at all courts, the number of offenders sentenced to immediate custody decreased by four per cent from 76,300 in 2005 to 73,500 in 2006. Twenty four per cent of offenders sentenced for indictable offences in 2006, attracted a custodial sentence. Custody rates decreased in both the Crown Court and magistrates' courts in 2006. In the Crown Court, the custody rate for indictable offences dropped from 60 per cent in 2005 to 57 per cent in 2006; in magistrates' courts, there was a very small decrease and the overall figure stayed around 14 per cent.
- The average custodial sentence lengths for indictable offences at the Crown Court¹ increased from 22.4 months in 1996 to 25.2 months in 2006. However, this was a decrease from 25.9 months in 2005. In magistrates' courts during this period, they remained at between 2.7 months and 3.0 months.
- The suspended sentence order (SSO) was introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003 for offences committed from April 2005 and replaced the fully suspended sentence (FSS). The number of offenders who received suspended sentences at all courts in 2006 increased more than three fold (245%) since 2005, from 9,700 to 33,500. A higher proportion of offenders were sentenced to suspended sentences at the Crown Court.

Introduction

- 2.1 This chapter highlights some of the key statistics relating to custodial sentences (immediate and suspended) given in 2006. It includes statistics on custody rates² and average custodial sentence lengths and estimates their impact on prisons. More information on prisons is available from RDS-NOMS 'Offender Management Caseload Statistics 2006' (OMCS website, refer to Appendix 5).
- 2.2 Custodial sentences include immediate custody and suspended sentence orders. Over the last ten years, immediate custody has included:
 - persons aged 12 to 14 given either Secure Training Orders under the Criminal Justice and Public Order Act 1994 (implemented in March 1998) or Detention

- and Training Orders (DTOs); these superseded Secure Training Orders in April 2000:
- persons aged 10 to 17 at the time of an offence of murder sentenced under section 90 and persons aged 10 to 17 at the time of conviction under section 91 of the Powers of Criminal Courts (Sentencing) Act 2000³;
- persons aged 15 to 20 sentenced to detention in a Young Offenders' Institution (YOI) or custody for life and persons aged 15 to 17 sentenced to a DTO⁴;
- persons aged 21 and over sentenced under the Criminal Justice Act 1991 to immediate custody including life imprisonment;
- persons aged 18 and over sentenced under the Criminal Justice Act 2003 to intermittent custody (piloted from January 2004 but discontinued from November 2006);
- persons aged 10 and over sentenced to imprisonment (detention for persons under 18) for public protection (IPP), extended sentences of imprisonment (detention for persons under 18) for sexual and violent offenders (EPP) under the Criminal Justice Act 2003 (from April 2005);
- persons given the standard determinate sentence (also from April 2005).
- 2.3 The average custodial sentence length is calculated for all determinate custodial sentences. Indeterminate sentences, such as life sentences and the growing number of imprisonment for public protection sentences (introduced in April 2005 under the Criminal Justice Act 2003) cannot be included as the length of the sentence is not known. Offenders receiving an indeterminate sentence for public protection for a serious offence would under previous sentencing frameworks have received a lengthy determinate sentence that would have been included in the calculation of average custodial sentence length. These longer sentences are now excluded from the calculation. This may result in a reduction in average custodial sentence lengths. See Appendix 1, paragraph 1.23 and 1.24 for further details of IPPs.


Immediate custody (all offences)

- 2.4 The total number of persons sentenced to immediate custody increased by 13 per cent from 1996 to 2006. The number of persons sentenced to immediate custody for all offences decreased from 2005 by just over 5,000, or five per cent, to 96,000 in 2006 (Tables 2.1, 2.2 and 2.3). This was made up of a decrease at magistrates' courts of around 3,800, or seven per cent, to 53,400 and a decrease at the Crown Court of 1,400, or three per cent, to 42,600.
- 2.5 In 2006, the Crown Court accounted for 44 per cent of all immediate custodial sentences given by the courts (Tables 2.2 and 2.3). This is a small increase from 43 per cent in 2005 but a decrease from 52 per cent in 1996.

- 2.6 The total number of persons sentenced at magistrates' courts decreased in 2006; however, the custody rate remained stable at four per cent, compared with three per cent in 1996 (Table 2.1). The custody rate decreased from 58 per cent to 56 per cent at the Crown Court between 2005 and 2006, the lowest level seen in the last ten years.
- 2.7 The total number of persons sentenced decreased in 2006 in each age group for both males and females, with the exception of females aged 18-20 where there was a slight rise (less than two per cent) (Table 2.4). For those given custody, there was a decrease in each age group and for both sexes, except males aged 10-17 where there was an increase of four per cent.

Immediate custody (indictable offences⁵)

- 2.8 In 2006, 77 per cent of all custodial sentences were for indictable (including triable either way) offences (Table 2.5). This is one percentage point higher than the proportion in 2005. This figure was also 77 per cent in 1996 (Figure 2.2).
- 2.9 For indictable offences at all courts, the number of persons sentenced to immediate custody decreased, by four per cent from 2005 to 73,500 in 2006 (Tables 2.1, 2.2 and 2.3). This was made up of a decrease in the number sentenced to immediate custody in the magistrates' courts of four per cent and in the Crown Court of three per cent.






Figure 2.3: Percentage of indictable offenders given custodial sentences at all courts, 1996–2006

- 2.10 Although the percentage of custodial sentences accounted for by indictable offences (Figure 2.2) was the same in 1996 as in 2006, although it was less in many of the intervening years, the custody rate for indictable offences (Figure 2.3) has tended to increase, although the figure has fluctuated between 24 and 25 per cent since 2002.

Figure 2.2: Custody rates for indictable offences at all courts, 1996–2006


2.11 Custody rates for indictable offences again decreased in both the Crown Court and magistrates' courts in 2006. In the Crown Court, the custody rate dropped three percentage points from 60 per cent in 2005 to 57 per cent in 2006, the lowest rate in the years since 1996; in magistrates' courts, the decrease was a marginal one, and the custody rate remained at 14 per cent. There had been a period of sustained growth between 1996 and 2002 at magistrates' courts and between 1997 and 2000 at the Crown Court. (Table 2.11 and Figure 2.4).

Figure 2.4: Custody rates for indictable offences, 1996–2006




2.12 The average custodial sentence length for indictable offences decreased at the Crown Court, from 25.9 to 25.2 months between 2005 and 2006 (Table 2.12). At magistrates' courts, the average custodial sentence length for indictable offences remained at 2.9 months between 2005 and 2006. The average custodial sentence length for indictable offences in the Crown Court increased by 13 per cent, from 1996 to 2006. In magistrates' courts during this period, it remained between 2.7 and 3.0 months. Figure 2.5 shows that the decrease in average custodial sentence lengths at the Crown Court in the last two years has reversed the longer-term trend between 1996 and 2004. Average custodial sentence lengths have been stable at magistrates' courts for the past ten years.

2.13 Figure 2.6 shows how the average custodial sentence length has changed over the last decade at the Crown Court, split by offence group. The decrease in overall average sentence length between 2005 and 2006 has been across most offence groups except indictable motoring offences and other indictable offences.

Custodial sentences under the Criminal Justice Act 2003

- 2.14 Persons of all ages sentenced to indeterminate imprisonment (or detention in a YOI) for public protection (IPP) and extended sentences of imprisonment (or extended sentence of detention in a YOI) for sexual and violent offences (EPP) are shown in Table 2.9. The table also shows persons given determinate sentences, those sentenced to life and those sentenced to a suspended sentence, together with a total of all custodial sentences, whether immediate or suspended.
- 2.15 Determinate sentences (excluding extended sentences) increased from 84,900 in 1996 to 92,700 in 2006 (nine per cent) peaking in 2002 at 110,600. Between 2005 and 2006 they fell by six per cent.
- 2.16 1,300 persons were sentenced to an EPP in 2006 (although this figure may include a small number of persons sentenced to the previously available extended sentence under the Powers of Criminal Courts (Sentencing) Act 2000). 1,450 persons were sentenced to an IPP, 2006 being the first full year for which these sentences were available.
- 2.17 129,500 persons were sentenced to custody (immediate and suspended) in 2006, up from 88,600 or 46 per cent in 1996 (although this increase was largely as a result of suspended sentences increasing from 3,400 to 33,500 over the period see paragraphs 2.28).

Sentencing under the Powers of Criminal Courts (Sentencing) Act 2000

- 2.18 Sections 109 and 110 of the Powers of Criminal Courts (Sentencing) Act 2000 came into force on 1 October 1997⁶. These sections provide that the court shall impose a life sentence on an offender convicted of a second serious offence and a sentence of at least seven years for a third drug trafficking (class A) offence. Section 109 has been replaced by the new indeterminate sentence of Imprisonment for Public Protection (IPP) which applies to offences committed after 4 April 2005.
- 2.19 Section 111 came into force on 1 December 1999 (originally enacted as section 4 of the Crime (Sentences) Act 1997). This provides that the Crown Court shall impose a sentence of at least three years for a third domestic burglary.
- 2.20 In each case, these sentences may be used if the offender:
 - was over 18 when they committed the offence;
 - committed the offence on or after the relevant section came into force;
 - had been convicted of:
 - the first serious offence:
 - one of the two class A drug offences; or
 - two domestic burglaries (one committed after conviction for the other) before the current conviction;
 - had committed both the previous burglaries on or after 1 December 1999.
- 2.21 The court has discretion not to impose these sentences if it is of the opinion that there are exceptional circumstances relating to either of the offences, or to the offender, which justify its not doing so.
- 2.22 Table 2.6 shows persons sentenced under these provisions, as notified to the Ministry of Justice (previously Home Office) since 2000 (when the Crown Court computer system was updated to recognise these offences). According to the reports received from the courts, very few of this type of sentence are given. This is, in part, because these sentences only apply after one or two previous convictions and it will take time for numbers to build up. This may explain the increase in the number of persons sentenced under section 111 (46 in 2004, 89 in 2005 and 229 in 2006).
- 2.23 It is possible that sentences under sections 109 to 111 are not being correctly recorded in the statistics that are sent to the Ministry of Justice (previously Home Office). This would result in these disposals being undercounted.

Intermittent custody

2.24 On 26 January 2004, pilots of the new sentence of Intermittent Custody (IC) began at two prisons: Kirkham, near Preston, for adult male offenders and Morton Hall, in Lincolnshire, for females. IC is one of the sentences introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003. It is designed to reduce the negative outcomes, such as loss of employment, accommodation, and family disintegration, which can accompany even short periods of full-time custody. IC sentences can be imposed only by authorised

- courts in the eleven Probation areas⁶ selected to participate in the pilot scheme. IC is not intended to replace community-based sentences. It is a custodial sentence and should be used only when the sentencing threshold has been crossed.
- 2.25 In 2006, there were just 80 cases where intermittent custody was imposed, compared with 186 in 2005 (Table 2.5).
- 2.26 The use of this disposal was discontinued from November 2006.

Suspended sentence orders

- 2.27 The suspended sentence order (SSO) was introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003 for offences committed from April 2005 and replaced the fully suspended sentence (FSS). This new sentence may be given to persons aged 18 and above (previously 21 and above) with a range of additional requirements similar to the community order: unpaid work, activity requirement, programme requirement, prohibited activity requirement, curfew requirement, exclusion requirement, supervision requirement, attendance centre requirement (where the offender is aged under 25). See 'Offender Management Caseload Statistics 2006' for further details (OMCS website, refer to Appendix 5).
- 2.28 In 2006, 33,500 suspended sentence orders were imposed, over three times the number (9,700) in 2005 and nearly 10 times the number (3,400) in 1996. number of persons who received suspended sentences at magistrates' courts in 2006 increased more than three-fold over 2005, from 7,100 to 23,300, having been around 1,200 on average in the years from 1996 to 2004.
- 2.29 At the Crown Court 10,200 suspended sentences were imposed in 2006, nearly four times more than the 2,600 imposed in 2005. From 2001 to 2004 at the Crown Court, the figure remained stable at around 1,600 following a reduction from 2,300 in 1997 (Table 2.21).
- 2.30 The proportion of persons who were sentenced to suspended sentences at magistrates' courts was two per cent in 2006, compared with 0.1 per cent in 2004, the last full year before the changes brought about by the Criminal Justice Act 2003. At the Crown Court, the increase was from two per cent in 2004 to 13 per cent in 2006.

High-volume offences

2.31 The offence at magistrates' courts which generated the greatest number of custodial sentences in 2006 was 'theft from shops' (around 10,600). This was followed by 'driving while disqualified' (around 7,400) and 'common assault' (around 5,200).

2.32 At the Crown Court in 2006, most custodial sentences were imposed for 'other burglary in a dwelling' (around 4,400). This offence relates to burglary in a dwelling not covered by the specific offences 'burglary with the intent to commit an offence triable only on indictment' and 'burglary with the commission of an offence triable only on indictment or with violence or the threat of violence'. The second highest

volume of custodial sentences (around 4,200) was given for the offence 'robbery'. This does not align with the offence group robbery, which is shown throughout this publication, as that also includes the offence 'assault with intent to rob'. The next highest volume custodial offences were 'assaults occasioning actual bodily harm'

3. Community sentences

Key points

- The total number of community sentences has seen a steady increase between 1996 and 2006 with the number increasing by 44 per cent from 132,600 to 190,800 during this period. Between 2005 and 2006, the rate of community sentences at the Crown Court fell from 30 per cent to 23 per cent; however, the rate at magistrates' courts remained stable at 13 per cent.
- The number of offenders given community sentences for *indictable* offences fell between 2005 and 2006 from 111,700 to 103,000. This formed 34 per cent of the total number of offenders sentenced for *indictable* offences, compared with 37 per cent in 2005.
- All the old types of community sentence¹ applicable to adults declined in number in 2005 with the introduction of the community order from April 2005 for *indictable* offences.

Introduction

- 3.1 This chapter highlights some of the key statistics relating to community sentences given in 2006. It includes statistics on the overall trends in the different community sentences and the rates at which people are sentenced to community penalties. For further detailed information, please see 'Offender Management Caseload Statistics 2006', (Ministry of Justice).
- 3.2 The community order was introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003 and came into force for offences committed on or after 4 April 2005. As part of the reform of sentences, the various kinds of community order previously available for adults have been replaced by this single generic community order with a range of possible requirements. Courts are able to choose different elements to make up a bespoke community order, which is relevant to that particular offender and the crime(s) they committed. Technological advances, such as electronic tagging, provide ways to restrict liberty and reduce crime without requiring a prison sentence. (See Appendix 1 for details and also 'Offender Management Caseload Statistics 2006', Chapter 6).


Trends in community sentences (all offences)

3.3 The total number of community sentences given at all courts increased by 44 per cent from 132,600 to 190,800 between 1996 and 2006. Between 2005 and 2006, the number decreased by seven per cent (see Table 3.3).

¹ This includes; Community rehabilitation orders, supervision orders, community punishment orders, attendance centre orders, curfew orders, drug treatment and testing orders etc.


Figure 3.1: Proportion of community sentences given at magistrates' courts (all offences), 1996–2006

- 3.4 In 2006, 91 per cent of community sentences were given at magistrates' courts. This proportion has increased by two percentage points since 2004. The longer-term variation is shown in Figure 3.1. The proportion of all community sentences given by the magistrates' courts has increased since 1996.
- 3.5 There was a five per cent decrease in community sentences for all offences at magistrates' courts between 2005 and 2006 (Table 3.1). The total number of community sentences in magistrates' courts in 2006 was 173,600, this was13 per cent of all sentences at magistrates' courts. This proportion remained at 13 per cent in 2005 and 2006, after a steady increase from eight per cent in 1996.
- 3.6 At the Crown Court, the number of community sentences fell by 23 per cent, between 2005 and 2006, to around 17,200, the lowest level in the last ten years. The proportion of those sentenced at the Crown Court over this period who were given community sentences has also fallen to 23 per cent in 2006 from 30 per cent in 2005, which is also the lowest level in the past ten years (Tables 3.2 and 3.11).

- 3.7 The change in the different types of community sentence at the Crown Court shows a slightly different pattern from that at magistrates' courts mainly because juveniles are not dealt with at the Crown Court. There have been decreases for all the old community sentences, again because of the new community order introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003 in April 2005. For several types of community sentences, such as those only applicable to juveniles, there are so few sentences given at the Crown Court that reliable conclusions cannot be drawn about the significance of changes in numbers from year to year.
- 3.8 The proportion of persons given community sentences at all courts between 2005 and 2006 has decreased slightly for all persons aged over 18, but increased by two percentage points for persons aged 10–17 (Table 3.4).
- 3.9 The actual numbers given community sentences has remained stable for boys (10–17), decreased by seven per cent for men aged 18–20 and fell ten per cent

- for men aged 21 and over from 2005 to 2006. For women, the pattern is similar, with the number of community sentences for girls aged 10–17 increasing by two per cent, decreasing by nine per cent for women aged 18–20; and decreasing by eleven per cent for women aged 21 and over.
- 3.10 Figure 3.2 shows that the number of community sentences given to men aged 18–20 has remained fairly stable for ten years. The number of community sentences given to women and to younger males (aged 10–17) remained stable between 2002 and 2006. The largest change has occurred for men aged 21 and over: since 2001, there was a 24 per cent increase from 79,600 in 2001 to 98,200 in 2005, although this number reduced back to the 2002 level in 2006, at 88,200. This is still a rise of 21 per cent over the period 1996-2006.

Figure 3.2: Community sentences split by age and sex, 1996–2006




Trends in community sentences (indictable offences)

- 3.11 In 2006, 84 per cent of community sentences for indictable offences were given at magistrates' courts. This proportion has increased from 81 per cent in 2005 and is now the highest proportion in the last ten years.
- 3.12 The total number of community sentences given for indictable offences fell eight per cent between 2005 and 2006 to 103,000.
- 3.13 As noted earlier, all the old types of community sentence applicable to adults declined in number in 2006 with the introduction of the community order from April 2005 (see paragraph 3.2 for details). Referral orders, which are only applicable to juveniles, fell by one per cent for indictable offences. Figure 3.3 shows that the most commonly used community sentence for indictable offences for persons aged 10-17 in 2006 was the referral order, which accounted for 48 per cent of all community sentences given to this age group. The large increase in the community orders, shown in Figure 3.4 is due to the Criminal Justice Act 2003, which amalgamated many of the old community sentences into the community order. The old sentence types are now only applicable for offences committed prior to April 2005. See Figures 3.3 and 3.4 for a breakdown of


community sentences for juveniles in 2006 and the switch to community orders for adults (aged 18 and over) for 2004-2006.





Figure 3.6: Percentage of indictable offences given community sentences, 1996–2006

3.14 In 2006, 54 per cent of all community sentences were for indictable offences. This is about the same proportion as in 2005 and the lowest proportion for ten years, indicating an increasing use of community sentences for summary offences (Figure 3.5). From 2005 to 2006, the proportion of those sentenced for indictable offences that were given community sentences decreased from 37 per cent to 34 per cent (Figure 3.6).

Figure 3.5: Percentage of community sentences accounted for by indictable offences, 1996–2006

High-volume offences

- 3.15 The offence at magistrates' courts where a community sentence was imposed most frequently in 2006 was 'common assault' (around 23,600). This was followed by 'theft from shops' (around 18,300), 'driving with alcohol in the blood above the prescribed limit' (around 11,700), 'criminal damage, £5,000 or less' (around 10,400) and 'driving while disqualified' (around 10,100).
- 3.16 At the Crown Court community sentences were most often imposed for 'assaults occasioning actual bodily harm' (around 2,300), followed by 'affray' (around 1,800), 'burglary in a dwelling' (around 1,300) and 'wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm' (around 600).

4. Fines and other disposals

Key points

- The number of offenders fined for *all* offences dropped from 1,073,000 in 1996 to 961,500 in 2006, a decrease of ten per cent.
- Both the magistrates' courts and the Crown Court recorded the lowest figure for the number of offenders fined for *indictable* offences during the last decade at 50,100 and 1,600 respectively in 2006. The proportion of offenders fined for indictable offences declined at magistrates' courts from 36 per cent to 22 per cent and at the Crown Court from four per cent to two per cent between 1996 and 2006.
- Over the last decade, summary motoring offences have produced the highest volume of fines in magistrates' courts. The number of fines in this category has decreased by six per cent, from 590,500 in 2005 to 553,200 in 2006.

Introduction

- 4.1 This chapter looks at all types of disposal other than immediate custody (Chapter 2) and community sentences (Chapter 3). These other types of disposal are:
 - fines:
 - absolute and conditional discharges; and
 - otherwise dealt with.
- 4.2 The category 'otherwise dealt with' includes sentences of compensation, hospital or guardianship orders under the Mental Health Act 1983, police cells, recognizance and other disposals not separately shown elsewhere. It also includes sentences passed in pilot studies (except for intermittent custody, see Chapter 2) and cases where the result of the court proceeding was incorrectly recorded.

Trends in fines (all offences)

- 4.3 Fines are different from custodial and community sentences as they may be imposed on companies and other organisations. Therefore, Tables 4.1, 4.2 and 4.3 show the numbers of fines imposed on males, females and others (these groups combined are described as offenders).
- 4.4 The number of offenders fined for all offences at all courts dropped from 1,073,000 in 1996 to 930,100 in 2001 and then grew steadily to 2004 when it peaked at 1,082,700. This figure decreased by five per cent in 2005 to 1,025,100 and by six per cent in 2006 to 961,500.
- 4.5 Magistrates, who generally deal with less serious cases, give fines within specified bands and are subject to a top limit. The Crown Court deals with the more serious offences and has the power to award unlimited fines. As would be expected, the number of fines given at the Crown Court (Table 4.2) is much smaller than at magistrates' courts (Table 4.1). However, the average amount of the fine is higher at the Crown Court (Table 4.7) than at magistrates' courts (Table 4.6), in particular the amount in 'other' (companies and other public bodies) in relation to safety-related cases.

- 4.6 Between 1996 and 2006, at magistrates' courts, the total number of offenders fined decreased by 10 per cent to 959,400 while the total number of offenders sentenced decreased by one per cent to 1,344,000. This resulted in a decrease in the proportion of offenders fined at magistrates' courts from 78 per cent to 71 per cent in ten years (Table 4.4 and Figure 4.1). The total number of offenders fined at magistrates' courts for all offences decreased by six per cent from 2005 to 2006. This is the second consecutive year-on-year decrease. It is possible that the Penalty Notice for Disorder (see Chapter 1), which came into effect in 2004 as an alternative to court proceedings, may account for a small proportion of the decrease found.
- 4.7 The total number of fines for summary motoring offences at magistrates' courts was 585,400 in 1996 (Table 4.1). This offence group has produced the highest number of fines throughout the period 1996 to 2006. The figure dropped by 13 per cent to a low of 511,100 in 2001 and then increased by 22 per cent to a high of 622,400. In 2004 it then dropped by five per cent in 2005 to 590,500, the first decrease in five years and dropped again by six per cent in 2006 to 553,200, its lowest level since 2002. The proportion fined for this offence group has varied between 87 and 90 per cent since 1996 (Table 4.5).

Figure 4.1: Proportion of offenders fined at magistrates' courts, 1996–2006





Figure 4.2: Proportion of offenders fined at the Crown Court, 1996–2006



- 4.8 There were 2,100 fines at the Crown Court in 2006, a decrease of nine per cent from 2005. The proportion of offenders fined at the Crown Court remained at three per cent in 2004 and 2005 (Figure 4.2 and Table 4.5).
- 4.9 The average fine imposed on persons for all offences by the Crown Court decreased by 12 per cent to £750 from 2005 to 2006. The average fine imposed on persons for all offences by magistrates' courts increased by five per cent to £150 between 2005 and 2006 (Tables 4.6 and 4.7).
- 4.10 The average fine given at the Crown Court to persons for all offences from 1996 to 2006 has increased from £460 to £750, The average fine given to persons at magistrates' courts for all offences increased from £130 to £150.
- 4.11 In 2006, persons sentenced at the Crown Court for other indictable (excluding motoring) offences had the largest average fine imposed (£1,480). This is an increase of one per cent from 2005. Fraud and forgery had the second largest average in 2006 at £1,260. This is an increase of 31 per cent from 2005.
- 4.12 At magistrates' courts in 2006 the largest average fine imposed on persons was for indictable motoring offences (£230). This is an increase of eight per cent from 2005, when the same offence group had an average fine of £210 (Table 4.6).
- 4.13 The average fine imposed by magistrates' courts for others (companies and public bodies etc.) remained at £950 between 2005 and 2006 (Table 4.6). The average fine imposed by the Crown Court for others was £55,060 in 2006, a 48 per cent decrease from 2005. The significant drop in the average fine imposed by the Crown Court may be due to several health and safety related offences that resulted in fines of over £1,000,000 in 2005. These offences may only be tried at the Crown Court, causing a large increase in the average fine.
- 4.14 The average fine given at the Crown Court to others (companies and public bodies etc.) from 1996 to 2006 for all offences has more than doubled but the average fine given at magistrates' courts increased by 41 per cent. Among the fines imposed at the Crown Court in 2006, the average fine amount for

summary offences decreased from £13,200 in 2005, to £1,500 in 2006 (Table 4.7). The number of offenders in this category is very small (see Table 4.2) and therefore large variations in the figures are likely.

Trends in fines (indictable offences)

- 4.15 The number of offenders fined for indictable offences at all courts decreased by 12 per cent from 58,400 in 2005 to 51,600 in 2006 (Table 4.3). This comprised 17 per cent of the total number of offenders sentenced for indictable offences, compared with 16 per cent in 2005 and 28 per cent in 1996 (Table 4.5). Both the magistrates' courts and the Crown Court recorded the lowest figure for the number of offenders fined for the last decade at 50,100 and 1,600 respectively in 2006 (Tables 4.1 and 4.2).
- 4.16 The number of offenders receiving fines for drug offences at all courts decreased by two per cent from 2005 to 2006 (Table 4.3). Most of this decline can be explained by the reclassification of cannabis from a Class B to a Class C drug and the resulting reduction in persons proceeded against. This legislation was brought into force in January 2004, as part of the Criminal Justice Act 2003.
- 4.17 The proportion of offenders dealt with at magistrates' courts who were fined was much higher than at the Crown Court (Figures 4.1 and 4.2). At magistrates' courts, 22 per cent of offenders sentenced for indictable offences were fined, a decline of two percentage points from the previous year. During the same period, the proportion fined at the Crown Court decreased by half of one percentage point, to two per cent. The proportion of offenders fined for indictable offences declined at both magistrates' courts (36% to 22%) and at the Crown Court (4% to 2%) between 1996 and 2006, with 2006 representing the lowest proportion at both courts over the period. This decline is seen for most offence groups.
- 4.18 Parents were ordered to pay the fine in 13 per cent of cases for 10- to 17-yearolds where they received fines for indictable offences in 2006 (Table 4.12). This was a similar figure to 2005, where ten per cent of parents were ordered to pay fines. For offenders aged under 15 years, 46 per cent of their parents were ordered to pay the fine in 2006, compared to 33 per cent in 2005.

Trends in other disposals

- 4.19 The majority of indictable offenders sentenced to 'other' disposals received conditional discharges: 36,300 at magistrates' courts and 1,730 at the Crown Court in 2006 (Table 4.5). The rate of offenders sentenced to conditional discharges for all offences reduced from four to three per cent at the Crown Court and remained the same at seven per cent at magistrates' courts between 1996 and 2006.
- 4.20 Less than 0.1 per cent of offenders were given an absolute discharge in the Crown Court in 2006. By contrast the figure was nearly one per cent at the magistrate's courts. The number of offenders receiving absolute discharges at magistrates' courts went from 19,920 in 1996 to its lowest level at 11,810 in 2006. The number of offenders sentenced to absolute discharges also decreased at the Crown Court, from 100 in 1996 to 70 in 2006.

4.21 The number of offenders 'otherwise dealt with' (ordered to pay compensation, given hospital or guardianship orders, police cells or recognizances, etc.), for all offences, increased by 26 per cent from 1,510 to 2,050 at the Crown Court and by 116 per cent from 17,270 to 37,300 at magistrates' courts between 1996 and 2006 (Table 4.5). The rate of offenders 'otherwise dealt with' for all offences increased from two to three per cent at the Crown Court and by one to three per cent at magistrates' courts between 1996 and 2006.

Trends in compensation orders

- 4.22 In 2006, 137,450 offenders in both courts were ordered to pay compensation, an increase of four per cent on 2005 (Table 4.9). This increase was mainly among summary offences (excluding motoring offences). Over the period 2001 to 2006, the total number of offenders ordered to pay compensation at magistrates' courts increased by four per cent from 38,200 to 40,500 for indictable offences and increased by 55 per cent from 58,900 to 91,400 for summary offences. At the Crown Court, the total number of offenders ordered to pay compensation for indictable offences has remained relatively stable for the past three years at around 5,100.
- 4.23 Offenders sentenced at magistrates' courts in 2006 for criminal damage had the highest proportion of compensation orders at 51 per cent, compared to those for drug offences, with the lowest proportion at less than one per cent (Table 4.9). Figures were much lower at the Crown Court where the highest proportions of offenders were ordered to pay compensation for criminal damage, violence against the person and summary offences, all at around 15 per cent.
- 4.24 In 2006, parents were ordered to pay in 36 per cent of cases where 10- to 17-year-olds received a compensation order for indictable offences (Table 4.12). There has been a significant increase in parents ordered to pay compensation orders for children aged 15–17 (up nine percentage points to 30%) and under 15 (up nine percentage points to 58%) between 2001 and 2006.

Trends in confiscation orders for drug trafficking

- 4.25 In 2006, 960 confiscation orders were made for drug trafficking. This is a decrease of two per cent on the 980 confiscation orders made in 2005 (Table 4.10). The percentage of confiscation orders made for drug trafficking offences among all eligible offences remained at 14 per cent for 2005 and 2006.
- 4.26 More than half of the confiscation orders made were under £1,000 each year since 2000 (Table 4.10). There were only a few confiscation orders of £100,000 or over each year (1–3%).

Trends in forfeiture

- 4.27 The number of forfeiture orders in both courts combined was at 43,600 and 43,500 for 2005 and 2006 respectively. The number has increased by 62 per cent since 1996 (Table 4.11).
- 4.28 The majority of offenders given a forfeiture order by both magistrates' courts and the Crown Court from 2001 to 2006 had committed drug offences (Table 4.11). Just over 73 per cent of offenders sentenced for drug offences were

given a forfeiture order. This proportion increased by two percentage points to 73 per cent at magistrates' courts and reduced by three percentage points to 59 per cent in the Crown Court between 2005 and 2006. This offence group had a much higher percentage of forfeiture orders than other offence group.

High Volume Offences

4.29 The offences for which fines were most often imposed at magistrates' courts were for 'driving without insurance' (around 184,400), 'speeding' (around 152,900), 'failing to pay motor vehicle licence' (around 125,000) and 'miscellaneous motoring offences' (around 68,100).

5. Regional trends

Key points

- The numbers sentenced for all offences at all courts decreased across most criminal justice areas. Merseyside had the highest custody rate of nine per cent while Lincolnshire had the lowest custody rate of three per cent. The largest drop in average custodial sentence length for all offences over the last ten years was for West Mercia from 14.7 months in 1996 to 10.7 months in 2006. The greatest increase was for Warwickshire, which increased from 13.0 to 15.7 months.
- Criminal justice area custody rates for indictable offences ranged from nine per cent to 27 per cent for magistrates' courts and 46 per cent to 69 per cent for the Crown Court in 2006.

Introduction


- 5.1 This chapter examines the variation in sentencing between different areas of England and Wales. There are 42 criminal justice areas. These coincide with police force areas except in London where the Metropolitan and City of London police areas are combined. Magistrates' courts are organised into Local Justice Areas and the Crown Court may be divided into Crown Court centres. The first part of this chapter looks at custody rates, community sentence rates, fine rates and average custodial sentence lengths by criminal justice areas; the second part looks at particular offences analysed by Local Justice Areas and Crown Court centres.
- 5.2 More detailed data on local court area comparisons are available in 'The Sentence' published by the Sentencing Guidelines Council. Issue 06 of 'The Sentence', covering 1999 to 2005 was published in early 2007. Local data in this publication are presented according to the criminal justice area in which the offence was sentenced, rather than the police force area in which the offence was committed, and so will not be exactly comparable with Sentencing Statistics 2005 regional data. The publication is available from the sentencing guidelines website¹ (see Appendix 5 for details). Further regional Courts Proceedings data by area can be found in Supplementary Volumes 3 and 4 of the Criminal Statistics publication, which is available from the Ministry of Justice statistical publications website (see Appendix 5 for details).
- 5.3 Variation across the criminal justice areas can be attributed to one of two factors. On the one hand, sentencers in different criminal justice areas may pursue the same approach to sentencing, but the offences and offenders that they sentence may differ systematically, reflecting geographical differences in:
 - the mix of offences being sentenced at court;
 - the criminal histories of offenders being sentenced at court;
 - the use of pre-court diversion practices such as cautions, reprimands and penalty notices between police forces;
 - committal practices from magistrates' courts to the Crown Court for trial and / or sentencing.
- 5.4 On the other hand, the caseloads may be the same, but the sentencing approach different. In this case, there may be factors which explain the differences for example, courts in high-crime areas may pass heavier sentences than those where crime is low. Alternatively, the explanation may be found in less systematic and more idiosyncratic differences between courts.

- 5.5 These factors should be considered when making comparisons across areas. However, because the full impact of these factors is difficult to quantify (see Local Variations in Sentencing in England and Wales, 2007), this chapter simply presents an overview of local trends in sentencing data.
- 5.6 Significant differences occur in the numbers of persons sentenced across the 42 criminal justice areas. London (including the Metropolitan and City of London police force areas) accounts for the highest number with 221,500 persons sentenced (49,600)². Greater Manchester is the second highest with 89,400 persons sentenced (21,800). West Midlands 80,600 (20,200) and West Yorkshire 63,400 (14,200) were the next highest. Durham had the lowest number of persons sentenced for all offences with 9,800 (3,500).
- 5.7 A total of 1,412,900 persons were sentenced in England and Wales in 2006 (excluding companies, local authorities etc.). This represents a decrease of four per cent on 2005. For indictable offences, 302,500 persons were sentenced in 2006 a one per cent decrease on 2005. The numbers sentenced decreased across 30 of the 42 criminal justice areas.

- 5.8 At all courts and for all offences in 2006, Merseyside had the highest (area level) custody rate of nine per cent while Lincolnshire had the lowest at three per cent (see Table 5.1, Figure 5.1).
- 5.9 The introduction of Indeterminate sentences for Public Protection (IPPs) in April 2005 may have contributed to the reduction in average custodial sentence lengths in 2006. Many of the offenders who now receive IPPs would previously have received a

- lengthy determinate sentence that would have been included in the calculation of average custodial sentence length. These longer sentences are now excluded from the calculation (as their effective length is unknown). For further information, please refer to Appendix 1, Paragraphs 1.23 and 1.24.
- 5.10 Sussex had the longest average custodial sentence length for all offences in 2006 at 16.0 months (see Figure 5.2), while Essex had the shortest at 8.4 months.
- 5.11 The average custodial sentence length for all offences in 2006 was 12.4 months, a slight decrease from 12.6 months in 2005. Compared to 2005 figures, the average custodial sentence length has increased slightly in 16 of the 42 criminal justice areas. The largest increase was in Gloucestershire from 9.2 months in 2005 to 12.1 months in 2006. The largest decrease from 2005 to 2006 was in Sussex, from 18.2 months to 16.0 months.
- 5.12 The largest decrease in average custodial sentence length for all offences over the last ten years was for West Mercia from 14.7 months in 1996 to 10.7 months in 2006. The greatest increase was for Warwickshire, from 13.0 months in 1996 to 15.7 months in 2006.

Figure 5.2: Average custodial sentence length (excluding life and indeterminate sentences) for all offenders sentenced at all courts by criminal justice area, 2006






Figure 5.3: Custody rate for all offenders sentenced at magistrates' courts for indictable offences by criminal justice area, 2006




5.13 Criminal justice area custody rates for indictable offences ranged from seven to 19 per cent for magistrates' courts in 2006. Cheshire had the highest custody rate (19%); Northumbria had the lowest custody rate, at seven per cent (see Figure 5.3 and Table 5.4).

Figure 5.4: Custody rate for all offenders sentenced at the Crown Court for indictable offences by criminal justice area, 2006




5.14 Criminal justice area custody rates for indictable offences ranged from 46 to 69 per cent for the Crown Court in 2006. Northamptonshire had the highest custody rate (69%) and Durham had the lowest custody rate at 46 per cent (see Figure 5.4 and Table 5.4).


5.15 In 2006, Sussex had the longest average custodial sentence length at the Crown Court for indictable offences at 28.6 months. North Wales has the shortest length at 19.8 months (see Figure 5.5 and Table 5.4).

Figure 5.6: Community sentence rate for all offenders sentenced at magistrates' courts for indictable offences by criminal justice area, 2006




5.16 In 2006, Northamptonshire had the highest community sentence rate at magistrates' courts for indictable offences at 48 per cent. Dorset had the lowest community sentence rate at 26 per cent (see Table 5.4 and Figure 5.6).

Figure 5.7: Community sentence rate for all offenders sentenced at the Crown Court for indictable offences by criminal justice area, 2006




5.17 In 2006, Durham had the highest community sentence rate at the Crown Court for indictable offences at 30 per cent. Bedfordshire had the lowest community sentence rate at 15 per cent (see Table 5.4 and Figure 5.7).

5.18 In 2006, Dorset had the highest fine rate for indictable offences at magistrates' courts at 31 per cent. West Yorkshire had the lowest fine rate at nine per cent (see Table 5.4 and Figure 5.8).

5.19 The fine rate for indictable offences at the Crown Court for all criminal justice areas is very low (see Figure 5.9). For 2006, Devon and Cornwall and Hertfordshire had the highest fine rate at just over four per cent and West Yorkshire had the lowest fine rate at just under one per cent.

Sentencing variations by offence

- 5.20 This section reports on the variation in sentencing for four high-volume offences: driving whilst disqualified, theft from shops, burglary in a dwelling and burglary in a non-dwelling. Burglary in a dwelling was among the offences with the highest volumes given community sentences at the Crown Court between 1996 and 2006. Burglary in a building other than a dwelling and driving whilst disqualified were among the high volume offences given community sentences in magistrates' courts in 2006. Theft from shops is one of the highest volume indictable offences.
- 5.21 Figures 5.10–5.27 present custody rates³, average custodial sentence lengths and community sentence rates for the specified offences. In each case the rate or sentence length is split into a series of bands (e.g. >0 to 5%, >5% to 10% etc.) and the number of Local Justice Areas (for magistrates' courts) or Crown Court centres (for the Crown Court) in each band is plotted as a histogram⁴. Each histogram illustrates how sentencing varies between the local justice areas or Crown Court centres. If all the areas gave exactly the same sentences, there would only be one bar in each histogram. The greater the spread of the histogram, the greater the variation between areas. A statistic known as the inter-quartile range is used to indicate the degree of variability in each graph. The inter-quartile range covers the middle 50 per cent of a set of data (i.e. it excludes the highest 25 per cent and the lowest 25 per cent of the data values). The larger the inter-quartile range, the greater the variability or spread. For example, the inter-quartile range in custody rate for Theft from shops the Crown Court is 20 per cent. The equivalent inter-quartile range in custody rate in magistrates' courts is nine per cent, indicating possible greater variability at the Crown Court.

Driving whilst disqualified

- 5.22 Driving whilst disqualified is a summary motoring offence that is not normally tried at the Crown Court⁵. Therefore the data presented below is for magistrates' courts only.
- 5.23 For driving whilst disqualified, custody rates cluster around the 20 to 35 per cent range (see Figure 5.10). The average custody rate is 30 per cent, as is the median⁶ or middle rate. The inter-quartile range, which is a measure of the spread of the data, is 13 per cent.

Figure 5.10: Custody rates at magistrates' courts Local Justice Areas for driving whilst disqualified, 2006






Figure 5.11: Average custodial sentence lengths at magistrates' courts Local Justice Areas for driving whilst disqualified, 2006



5.24 Average custodial sentence lengths for driving whilst disqualified cluster around the 3.0 to 4.0 month range (see Figure 5.11). The average length is 3.5 months as is the median or middle rate. The inter-quartile range is 0.6 months.

Figure 5.12: Community sentence rates at magistrates' courts Local Justice Areas for driving whilst disqualified, 2006




5.25 The community sentence rate for driving whilst disqualified clusters around the 35 to 50 per cent range (see Figure 5.12). The mean rate is 42 per cent, as is the median or middle rate, and the inter-quartile range is 13 per cent.

Theft from shops


5.26 Theft from shops is usually tried at magistrates' courts. As such, only magistrates' courts data are presented here. Crown Court data are given in Table 5.a.

5.27 For theft from shops, the custody rate clusters around 10 to 20 per cent (see Figure 5.13). The mean and median are both 17 per cent and the inter-quartile range is nine per cent.


Figure 5.14: Average custodial sentence lengths at magistrates' courts Local Justice Areas for theft from shops, 2006

5.28 The average custodial sentence lengths for theft from shops cluster around 1.0 to 3.0 months (see Figure 5.14). The mean and the median sentence length are both two months and the inter-quartile range is 0.6 months.

Figure 5.15: Community sentence rates at magistrates' courts Local Justice Areas for theft from shops, 2006




5.29 The community sentence rate for theft from shops is clustered around 25 to 45 per cent (see Figure 5.15). The mean and median community rates at magistrates' courts are both 32 per cent. The inter-quartile range is 12 per cent.

Burglary in a dwelling


5.30 The burglary in a dwelling sentencing data for magistrates' courts and the Crown Court are presented separately to illustrate any differences in sentencing practice between courts.

5.31 For burglary in a dwelling, the custody rate at magistrates' courts is clustered around 15 to 30 per cent (see Figure 5.16). The median is 23 per cent and the mean is 25 per cent. The inter-quartile range is 15 per cent.


Figure 5.17: Average custodial sentence lengths at magistrates' courts Local Justice Areas for burglary in a dwelling, 2006



5.32 The average custodial sentence lengths for burglary in a dwelling in the magistrates' courts cluster around 3 to 8 months⁷ (see Figure 5.17). The median is 5.2 months and the mean is 5.4 months. The inter-quartile range is 2.6 months.



Figure 5.18: Community sentence rates at magistrates' courts Local Justice Areas for burglary in a dwelling, 2006





Figure 5.19: Custody rates at Crown Court centres for burglary in a dwelling, 2006





Figure 5.21: Community sentence rates at Crown Court centres for burglary in a dwelling, 2006




- 5.36 Community sentence rates for burglary in a dwelling at Crown Court centres cluster around 15 to 25 per cent. The mean and the median are both 20 per cent, and the inter-guartile range is nine per cent
- 5.37 Comparing the figures for the Crown Court and magistrates' courts shows two distinct patterns of sentencing. At the Crown Court, where the majority of burglaries are sentenced, custody rates are higher (median value of 69 per cent compared with 23 per cent at magistrates' courts), average sentence lengths longer (median of 24.6 compared with 5.2 months) and community sentence rates lower (median of 20 per cent compared to 63 per cent in magistrates' courts). The spread in the data (as measured by the inter-quartile range) between Crown Court centres compared to the magistrates' courts is similar for custody rates, but larger for community sentence rates. This is to be expected as magistrates only deal with cases that fall within their sentencing powers.



Figure 5.22: Custody rates at magistrates' courts Local Justice Areas for burglary in a building other than a dwelling, 2006





Figure 5.23: Average custodial sentence lengths at magistrates' courts Local Justice Areas for burglary in a building other than a dwelling, 2006





Figure 5.24: Community sentence rates at magistrates' courts Local Justice Areas for burglary in a building other than a dwelling, 2006





Figure 5.25: Custody rates at Crown Court centres for burglary in a building other than a dwelling, 2006





- 5.44 Community sentence rates for burglary in a building other than a dwelling at the Crown Court cluster around 5 to 30 per cent (Figure 5.27). The mean is 22 per cent and the median is 21 per cent. The inter-quartile range is 17 months.
- 5.45 As was the case with burglary in a dwelling⁸, comparing the figures for the Crown Court and magistrates' courts shows two different patterns of sentencing. At the Crown Court, custody rates are higher (median 67 per cent compared with 23 per cent in magistrates' courts), average sentence lengths longer (18.0 months compared with 3.7 months) and community sentence rates lower (21 per cent compared with 55 per cent in magistrates' courts).

Introduction

1.1 The procedures and sentences described relate mainly to the period from the implementation of the Criminal Justice Act 1991 on 1 October 1992 to the end of 2006. No account is taken of changes introduced in 2007 by means of legislation, circulars etc.

Detection, charging and remanding

Categories of offences

- 1.3 Criminal offences are split into three categories as follows:
 - i) Triable only on indictment

These offences are the most serious breaches of the criminal law and must be tried at the Crown Court. These 'indictable-only' offences include murder, manslaughter, rape and robbery.

ii) Triable either way

These offences may be tried either at the Crown Court or at a magistrates' court. These offences include criminal damage where the value is £5,000 or greater, theft and burglary.

iii) Summary

These offences are triable only by a magistrates' court. This group is dominated by motoring offences for some of which fixed penalties can be issued, but also includes such offences as common assault and criminal damage up to £5,000.

Proceedings at Magistrates' Courts

- 1.4 Just under 1.8 million defendants were proceeded against in magistrates' courts in 2006; 406,000 for indictable offences (including triable either way), 612,000 for summary non-motoring offences and 761,000 for summary motoring offences.
- 1.5 From 15 January 2001, committal proceedings for indictable-only offences were abolished and new provisions contained in Section 51, 52 and Schedule 3 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 were introduced to speed up the justice process. Defendants charged with an indictable-only offence and appearing before a magistrates' court for the first time on or after the date are sent immediately to the Crown Court. Magistrates will consider bail and other minor issues, but they do not consider whether there is a case to answer. Indictable-only charges that could, prior to 15 January 2001, be transferred under either the 1987 or 1991 Acts are sent to the Crown Court under the section 51 procedure (Schedule 8, Paragraphs 65 and 93 Crime and Disorder Act 1998).
- 1.6 In serious or complex fraud cases, and those involving child witnesses, there is provision for the prosecutor to lodge a notice with the magistrates' court, stating that the case should be immediately transferred to the Crown Court. These cases then automatically transfer, and a judge is assigned to the case and hears any application to dismiss the charges.
- 1.7 For a triable either way offence, magistrates have to decide whether to try the case themselves (summary trial) or to commit the case for trial to the Crown Court (trial on indictment). For persons aged 18 and over, 16 per cent of defendants proceeded against for triable-either-way cases were committed to the Crown Court for trial in 2004, and a further six per cent of defendants in triable-either-way cases were committed for sentence.
- 1.8 Even if the magistrates decide not to commit the case to Crown Court, the defendant may elect to be tried by jury.
- 1.9 Since October 1997, magistrates have been able to hear the defendant's plea before making a decision on where the case should be tried. This procedure is known as 'Plea Before Venue'. If the defendant indicates a guilty plea, the magistrates are required to convict the offender and either pass sentence or commit the defendant to the Crown Court for sentence if the magistrates feel that the appropriate sentence is beyond their powers (magistrates can sentence up to six months in prison and fine up to £5,000). If the defendant indicates a not guilty plea, the magistrates must decide whether they consider the case is too serious to be dealt with summarily. Hence, under this new procedure, some defendants who would have been committed for trial to the Crown Court under the old system will be dealt with entirely by proceedings in magistrates' courts or be committed for sentence to the Crown Court thereby reducing the numbers committed for trial. A comparison of 2006 figures with

- those for 1997 shows that the number of defendants committed for sentence increased by 11,600 and the number committed for trial decreased by 8,200. These changes reflected the influence of plea before venue proceedings.
- 1.10 When the charge is for several offences, some of which are triable either way and others summary, and the triable either way offences are transferred for trial, certain specific summary offences may also be included on the indictment, including driving while disqualified, common assault and taking a motor vehicle without authority. However, the Crown Court may only pass sentences that are within magistrates' powers for these offences.

Proceedings before magistrates

1.11 On summary trial the court will read the charge to the accused and ask whether they plead guilty or not guilty. If the accused pleads not guilty, the court will hear evidence and may convict the accused or dismiss the case. Over 90 per cent of defendants on summary trial plead guilty. In this case, the court will usually hear an outline of the case from the prosecution and then proceed to the sentencing stage. However, where the defendant pleads guilty and then says something which indicates a defence to the charge or says, for example, that the plea is entered 'to get the case over with', the guilty plea must be rejected. If the prosecutor appears but the accused fails to appear as requested then the court, on proof of service of summons, may proceed in their absence or adjourn the hearing or, in certain cases, issue a warrant for arrest. If the accused appears but the prosecutor does not, the court may dismiss the case or adjourn the trial. Where the offender is convicted, the court may proceed to sentence immediately or may adjourn if further information is required before sentencing. Defendants may be invited to plead guilty for certain summary (mostly motoring) offences by post and therefore avoid a court appearance.

Trial at the Crown Court

- 1.12 The usual route to the Crown Court is by committal from magistrates' courts. Two alternative routes exist:
 - (a) The first is by application to the High Court for leave to prefer a "voluntary bill of indictment" where no proceedings for committal have taken place, or where a magistrates' court has dismissed a charge.
 - (b) The second is by "notice of transfer" where a person can be sent direct to the Crown Court when certain conditions apply.
- 1.13 In 2006 four per cent of those proceeded against were dealt with by the Crown Court. Of these, around 66 per cent plead guilty. As at the magistrates' court, in these cases the judge will move to the sentencing stage of the process. A jury is not involved in these cases.
- 1.14 Crown Court trial for defendants pleading not guilty is before a judge and jury. A jury consists of 12 persons randomly selected from a list of all those persons aged 18 to 70 who registered as electors and are neither ineligible nor disqualified. These jurors take an oath:
 - "I swear by Almighty God that I will faithfully try the defendant and give a true verdict according to the evidence."
- 1.15 The duty of the jury is to listen to the evidence and to give their verdict as to whether the accused is guilty or not guilty. The accused and the prosecution have the right to challenge any juror if it is believed someone involved in the case knows them or if they appear unable to understand the proceedings. The verdict of the jury in criminal proceedings need not be unanimous but must be at least ten to two. If the verdict is guilty, the judge of the court pronounces sentence. The court may order a convicted offender to pay the whole or any part of the costs incurred by the prosecution. On acquittal, the court may order the payment of defence costs from the central funds.

Proceedings involving young persons

- 1.16 Young people aged between 10 and 17 inclusive are mainly dealt with in the youth courts by specially trained magistrates. The youth court was introduced from 1 October 1992 and replaced the juvenile court, established in 1908, which dealt with offenders only up to and including those aged 16². In youth courts, no person is allowed to be present unless authorised by the court, except for the members and officers of the court, parties to the case (normally including parents/guardians), their legal representatives, witnesses and bona fide representatives of the media. Proceedings may be reported in the press but the young person may not generally be identified.
- 1.17 A child or young person is generally tried in the youth court unless any of the following apply:
 - a) He or she is charged with homicide (e.g. murder or manslaughter), when they must be sent to the Crown Court for trial;
 - b) He or she is aged 10 and under 18 and is charged with a 'grave crime' (an offence for which an adult could be imprisoned for at least 14 years), indecent assault or dangerous driving.

- These cases may be sent to the Crown Court if magistrates decide that if convicted, the appropriate sentence would be more than they have the power to give;
- c) He or she is charged jointly with another person aged 18 or over, when both should be dealt with in the Crown Court.

Sentencing

- 1.18 Under a statutory framework for sentencing introduced in the Criminal Justice Act 1991 (as amended by the Criminal Justice Act 1993), courts are generally required to impose sentences which reflect the seriousness of the offence or offences committed by the offender. The Act does not define 'seriousness'. The Court of Appeal has provided guidance on interpretation since the Act came into effect in October 1992. The Criminal Justice Act 2003 introduced a new sentencing framework but the principle that the seriousness of the offence determines the sentence given remains the same. In deciding what sentence to impose, the judge or magistrate will take account of:
 - i) The facts of the offence, which have been presented in court, including any aggravating or mitigating factors. In addition, a defendant pleading guilty may wish to admit other similar offences and such offences may be taken into consideration for the purpose of sentence without the offender being formally convicted of them and with no separate penalty being imposed.
 - ii) The circumstances of the offender. In the Crown Court, the prosecution will provide a statement known as 'the antecedents' covering details of the offence, previous convictions and sentences. In addition, a pre-sentence report (PSR) giving fuller information may be prepared for the court by a probation officer. This report contains information about the character, personality and social and domestic background of the defendant, educational record and information about employment (if any), assessment of impact on victim and risk of re-offending. It will include a proposal as to what community sentence (e.g. community rehabilitation order) would be most suitable for the offender if the court was to decide that such a sentence would be appropriate. In some cases, the Probation Service will prepare a specific sentence report (SSR). This is similar to a PSR, but focuses only on the suitability of a particular sentence. SSRs speed up the process when it is likely that a particular sentence most often community punishment order or community rehabilitation order will be given.
 - iii) Plea in mitigation. If a defence lawyer is present, they will make a speech in mitigation on behalf of the offender to give the court the defendant's explanation of the offence and any other matters going in the defendant's favour. This might include information about an early guilty plea. Pleading guilty at an early stage in the proceedings usually leads to a shorter sentence this is known as a sentence discount. Judges and magistrates are required, when sentencing an offender who has pleaded guilty, to take into account the stage at which the guilty plea was entered and the circumstances in which the plea was made. If a discounted sentence is passed, this must be stated in court. The Court of Appeal states that a discount of one-third should normally be given for a timely guilty plea.
- 1.19 The Sentencing Guidelines Council Guideline "Overarching Principles: Seriousness" deals with the concept of seriousness in relation to the sentencing decision and specifically within the context of the Criminal Justice Act 2003:
 - 'The *seriousness* of an offence is determined by two main parameters; the culpability of the offender and the harm caused or risked being caused by the offence'.
- 1.20 For summary offences, the majority of offenders are fined, 89 per cent for motoring offences and 72 per cent for non-motoring in 2006. For 'indictable only' and triable either way offences, much greater use is made of a variety of sentences or orders. The principal penalties are:

a) Imprisonment — adults

1.21 Imprisonment is the most severe penalty available to the courts, and is only available for more serious offences. Courts have the power to impose a sentence up to a maximum term specified by the Act of Parliament, which created the particular offence. Under the Criminal Justice Act 2003, a custodial sentence can normally only be imposed if the offence is 'so serious' that neither a fine alone nor a community sentence can be justified for the offence or the offence is specified violent or sexual offence and the offender is considered to pose a risk of serious harm. The maximum custodial penalty reflects the gravity of the worst possible case and is thus high for the most serious offences, e.g. life imprisonment for murder (for which it is mandatory), rape, robbery or manslaughter and 14 years for domestic burglary. A magistrates' court may not sentence to more than six months (or less than five days) for any one offence and no longer than 12 months in total, where sentences are being imposed for two or more triable-either-way offences and are to run consecutively. Where an offender is sentenced to

- imprisonment for several offences, the sentences may be ordered by the court to run either consecutively or concurrently, depending on a number of factors. Consecutive sentences will generally be appropriate, for example, where different types of offending behaviour are concerned.
- 1.22 Intermittent Custody was introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003. A pilot ran from January 2004 to November 2006. It applies only for sentences of under 12 months. Rather than offenders serving continuous imprisonment, custody is only at weekends or other times fixed by the court. This is intended to maintain community and family ties or try to develop them, and also employment.
- 1.23 The Criminal Justice Act 2003, Section 225, created a new sentence of imprisonment for public protection (IPP), which is an indeterminate sentence and was implemented on 4 April 2005. This sentence may only be passed if the offender is convicted of a specified sexual or violent offence (listed in Schedule 15 of the Act) carrying a maximum sentence of ten years or more and the court considers that the offender poses a significant risk of serious harm. Where the offence carries a maximum sentence of life imprisonment, the court must pass a discretionary life sentence if the seriousness of the offence justifies it. In all other cases to which the section applies, the court must impose a sentence of imprisonment for public protection. When passing sentence the court must set the length of the sentence that will be served in custody. Once this length of sentence has been served then release is dependent on the recommendation of the Parole Board.
- 1.24 Section 227 of the Act replaces and extends the current provisions for extended supervision for sexual and violent offenders (EPP) contained in section 85 of the Powers of Criminal Courts (Sentencing) Act 2000. They should be over 18, have committed a specified sexual or violent offence (listed in Schedule 15 of the Act) carrying a maximum penalty of between two and ten years and are judged by the court to pose a significant risk of serious harm to the public. The extended sentence is made up of the "appropriate custodial term" (the period that the court considers to reflect the seriousness of the offence committed (subject to a minimum of 12 months)) and an "extension period". During the second half of the appropriate custodial term the offender may be released on the recommendation of the Parole Board. The court must also specify an extended period of supervision on licence to be added to the sentence for the purpose of public protection. The court may add an extension period of up to five years for violent offenders and eight years for sexual offenders. The total term of the extended sentence must not be more than the maximum penalty available for the offence in question.
- 1.25 The Crime (Sentences) Act 1997 (as amended by the Powers of Criminal Courts (Sentencing) Act 2000) requires courts to impose minimum sentences on offenders committing repeat, serious offences. These include a mandatory sentence of life imprisonment for anyone over the age of 18 convicted of a serious offence that has a previous conviction for a similar offence. These serious offences include attempted murder, manslaughter, rape, violent offences (such as grievous bodily harm), and armed robbery. This sentence is automatic unless the court finds exceptional circumstances. The provision was repealed by the Criminal Justice Act 2003 which replaced it with IPP. There is also provision for a minimum prison sentence of seven years for a person over the age of 18, convicted of a class A drug trafficking offence who has two or more previous convictions for similar offences; and a minimum of three years imprisonment for a third offence of domestic burglary. These sentences should be imposed unless the court finds that they would be unjust in all the circumstances.

b) Custodial penalties for young offenders

- 1.26 The Criminal Justice Act 1991³ made a number of changes in the custodial sentencing arrangements for young offenders. It set a common minimum age of 15 for both boys and girls for the imposition of a sentence of detention in a young offender institution (previously the minimum age was 14 for boys and 15 for girls). The Act also set two months as a minimum period for which young offenders of either sex, aged 15 to 17, may be sentenced to detention in a young offender institution (the previous minima for those under 17 was 21 days for males and four months for females). The maximum determinate sentence for 15 to 17 years olds was increased to two years in February 1995, having previously been one year.
- 1.27 For young offenders aged 18–20, the minimum is 21 days and the maximum is the same as the adult maximum for the offence.
- 1.28 Juveniles aged 14–17 convicted at the Crown Court may be sentenced to be detained for up to the adult maximum, including life⁴ for offences carrying maximum sentences of 14 years or more imprisonment in the case of an adult, or for the offences of causing death by dangerous driving, causing death by careless driving while under the influence of alcohol or drugs and, for those aged 16 and 17, indecent assault. This also applies to offenders aged 10–13 convicted of murder or manslaughter.
- 1.29 The Criminal Justice and Public Order Act 1994 extended these provisions to 10–13 year olds. As of January 1995, 10–13 year olds convicted at the Crown Court for offences carrying maximum sentences of 14 years or more imprisonment in the case of an adult may also be detained for up to the adult maximum. Under 18s serving any of the custodial sentences may be held in local authority children's homes, secure training centres and prison service young offender institutions.

- 1.30 The 1994 Act also introduced secure training orders which were eventually implemented from 1st March 1998 but no longer existed after 31st March 2000. These were given to offenders aged 12-14 who had committed an imprisonable offence, having been convicted of at least three already, and had either breached a supervision order under the Children and Young Persons Act 1969 or been convicted of an imprisonable offence whilst subject to such an order. The order was made up of a period of detention in a secure training centre followed by a period of supervision and could last from six months to two years with detention taking up one half of the total time.
- 1.31 The Crime and Disorder Act 1998 introduced detention and training orders. These were implemented nationally from 1st April 2000, replacing detention in a young offender institution for those aged 15 to 17, and secure training orders for those aged 12 to 14. Orders are made for terms of 4, 6, 8, 10,12, 18 and 24 months. The Detention and Training Order is served partly in custody and partly in the community under the supervision of a probation officer, social worker or member of a youth offending team.
- 1.32 The Criminal Justice Act 2003, Section 226 applies the sentence of public protection (IPP) to those aged under 18 although for juveniles it is a sentence of detention rather than imprisonment. The sentence must be passed by a court if the offender is convicted of a specified sexual or violent offence carrying a maximum sentence of ten years or more and the court considers that the offender poses a significant risk of serious harm and an extended sentence would not be adequate for the purpose of protecting the public. Where the offence carries a maximum sentence of detention for life, the court must pass such a sentence, if the seriousness of the offence justifies it.
- 1.33 Section 228 of the Criminal Justice Act 2003 applies the extended sentence (EPP) to those aged under 18 whom the court considers to pose a significant risk of serious harm. Where the offender has been convicted of a specified offence the court must impose an extended sentence, unless the offence is a serious offence and the case is one in which a sentence under section 226 is appropriate. The sentence operates in the same way as it does for adults (see paragraph 1.24), but is a sentence of detention rather than imprisonment.

c) Life imprisonment

- 1.34 Life imprisonment, or its equivalent, must be imposed on all persons aged ten and over convicted of murder. It is also available for a number of the most serious crimes, including manslaughter, robbery, rape, assault with intent to do grievous bodily harm, aggravated burglary and certain firearms offences. For these offences, the court may choose instead to impose a prison sentence of a specified length or a non-custodial penalty. Additionally, there is a requirement for a life sentence for those convicted of a second serious offence, although this was replaced by IPP from April 2005 (see paragraph 1.25).
- 1.35 There is no entitlement to release during a life sentence but offenders may be considered for release on licence once they have served the minimum term set by the court. All life sentence prisoners are initially released under the supervision of a probation officer. The reporting conditions of the licence may be lifted after a period of time, if the individual has demonstrated that such restrictions are unnecessary.
- 1.36 For those convicted of murder the penalty is a mandatory life sentence. Anyone found guilty of murder committed when under the age of 18 must be sentenced to 'detention during Her Majesty's pleasure'⁴. A person aged under 18 convicted of an offence other than murder for which a life sentence may be passed on an adult may be sentenced to 'detention for life'⁴. A person convicted of murder who is aged 18 or over at the time of the offence but under 21 on conviction must be sentenced to 'custody for life'. This is also the maximum penalty when an offender aged 18 to 20 is convicted of any other offence for which an adult offender would be liable to life imprisonment.
- 1.37 For all life sentenced prisoners the sentencing court is able to specify a term after which the prisoner should be eligible for release procedures. When this term has been served prisoner is entitled to apply to the Parole Board for release. The Board has the power to direct the Home Secretary to release the prisoner on licence if satisfied that custody is no longer necessary for the protection of the public. These arrangements apply to prisoners of all ages, including young offenders.

d) Suspended sentence

- 1.38 A new suspended sentence order, introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003 came into force on 4 April 2005 and replaced the previous fully suspended sentence. It applies to persons aged 18 and over and is a sentence of custody of under 12 months, suspended for a period ranging from six months to two years and applies only to offences committed on or after that date. During the suspension period the court can set community requirements from the same options as are available for the community order unpaid work, activity requirement, programme requirement, prohibited activity requirement, curfew requirement, exclusion requirement, supervision requirement, attendance centre requirement (if the offender is aged under 25).
- 1.39 Where the offence was committed before 4 April 2005 the court may, in the case of a person over the age of 21, suspend a custodial sentence for up to two years for between one and two years if there are exceptional circumstances for doing so.

e) Community Punishment Orders (Community Service Orders prior to 1 April 2001)

1.40 An offender aged 16 or over who is convicted of an offence for which a court can send an adult to prison may be required to perform unpaid work on behalf of the community. Such orders involve a minimum of 40 hours and a maximum of 240 hours to be completed within 12 months. The work is under the direction of a community service organiser, working within the Probation Service. A wide variety of work is done including, for example, outdoor conservation projects, building adventure playgrounds, and painting and decorating for the elderly or disabled. Order replaced for persons aged 18 or over for offences committed on or after 4 April 2005 by the Community Order introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003.

f) Community Rehabilitation Orders (Probation Orders prior to 1 April 2001)

1.41 An offender aged 16 or over may be sentenced to a Community Rehabilitation Order for a period ranging from six months to three years. A court may make a Community Rehabilitation Order in the interests of securing the rehabilitation of the offender, protecting the public from harm, or preventing the commission of further offences. Community Rehabilitation Orders require the offender to be supervised by a probation officer. Additionally, the court has the power to include any other requirement considered appropriate. This could include residence at a specified address, activities, attendance at a probation centre, treatment for a mental condition and treatment for drug or alcohol dependency. Some probation centres run courses which offenders may attend for up to 60 days as a requirement of a community rehabilitation order. Youth Offending teams will supervise adult disposals available for 16 to 17 year olds such as Community Rehabilitation Orders and Community Rehabilitation and Punishment Orders. Order replaced for persons aged 18 or over for offences committed on or after 4 April 2005 by the Community Order introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003.

g) Supervision Order

1.42 For a young person aged 17 or under, an equivalent supervision order may be made for periods up to three years. The supervisor for such orders may either be a probation officer, the local authority (in the person of a local authority social worker) or a member of a youth offending team. They are required to meet with their supervisor at regular intervals and may also be required to undertake what are known as 'specified activities' to help them address their offending behaviour. Improvements to the supervision order (some provisions implemented from 30 September 1998) - sections 71 and 72 of the Crime and Disorder Act amended the Children and Young Persons Act 1969 strengthening the penalty of a supervision order for serious young offenders. Section 71 strengthens the order by enabling conditions requiring reparation to the victim of the offence (where they are willing to accept this) or the community at large to be attached as part of the order and simplifies the conditions which must be satisfied before the courts can impose a requirement to live in local authority accommodation as part of the order. Section 72 provides a number of options for courts for dealing with a breach of any supervision order.

h) Community Punishment and Rehabilitation Orders (Combination Orders prior to 1 April 2001)

1.43 This order was introduced in October 1992 by the Criminal Justice Act 1991 and amended by the Criminal Justice and Courts Act 2000. It combines elements of both community rehabilitation and community punishment orders and may be given to any offender aged 16 or over. The maximum duration of the probation element of the Community Punishment and Rehabilitation Order is three years and the minimum 12 months. When a Community Punishment and Rehabilitation Order is made, probation supervision continues for at least as long as community punishment is being undertaken. The minimum number of community punishment hours is 40 and the maximum 100. Order replaced for persons aged 18 or over for offences committed on or after 4 April 2005 by the Community Order introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003.

i) Community Order

1.44 The community order was introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003 and came into force on 4 April 2005. As part of the reform of sentences, the various kinds of community order previously available for adults have been replaced by this single generic community order with a range of possible requirements.

For all offences committed on or after that date, Courts are able to choose different elements to make up a bespoke community order which is relevant to that particular offender and the crime(s) they committed. Technological advances, such as electronic tagging provide ways to restrict liberty and reduce crime without requiring a prison sentence. The range of requirements available with a community order are:

Compulsory (unpaid) work; Participation in any specified activities; Programmes aimed at changing offending behaviour; Prohibition from certain activities; Curfew; Exclusion from certain areas; Residence requirement; Mental health treatment (with consent of the offender); Drug treatment and testing (with consent of the offender); Alcohol treatment (with consent of the offender); Supervision; Attendance at an attendance centre

i) Curfew Orders

1.45 Curfew orders require an offender to remain, for specific periods, at a specific address. Electronically monitored curfew orders have been available nationally since December 1999⁵. This involves the offender wearing an electronic 'tag' which, in combination with equipment located at the curfew address, monitors when the offender is at the address. If the offender leaves the address during curfew hours, or attempts to move or damage the equipment or tag, the private sector companies, which monitor the schemes, are alerted. Curfew orders can be made in addition to another community penalty. Electronically monitored curfew orders were made available from December 1999 for offenders aged 16 and over and from February 2001 for offenders aged 10–15. Order replaced for persons aged 18 or over for offences committed on or after 4 April 2005 by the Community Order (with a curfew requirement) introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003.

k) Reparation Orders

1.46 Reparation orders (piloted from 30 September 1998 and implemented nationally from 1 June 2000) requiring a young offender to make reparation to the victim of the offence (where they wish to receive this) or to the community at large. The order is not to exceed 24 hours in aggregate, and cannot be combined with a custodial sentence or with the community sentences specified in Section 67(4)(b) of the Crime and Disorder Act.

I) Action Plan Orders

1.47 Action plan orders (piloted from 30 September 1998 and implemented nationally from 1 June 2000) provide an intensive and individually tailored response to address a child's or young person's offending behaviour and the factors associated with it. It requires the offender to comply with a three month action plan, supervised by a probation officer, a social worker or a member of a youth offending team, designed to prevent re-offending and rehabilitate the offender. An element of reparation may only be included with the victim's consent. It may not be combined with a custodial sentence or with the other community sentences specified in Section 69(4)(b) of the Crime and Disorder Act.

m) Referral Orders

1.48 The Youth Justice and Criminal Evidence Act 1999 created a new sentence, referral to a youth offender panel, for first-time young offenders not given a discharge or custodial sentence. Pilots of the new sentence started in 2000 and were implemented nationally in April 2002, referral orders now being the main intervention for young offenders who plead guilty on their first court appearance.

n) Drug treatment and testing Orders

1.49 Drug treatment and testing orders (piloted from 30 September 1998 and implemented in October 2000) are aimed at those aged 16 or over who are convicted of crimes committed to fund their drug habit and who show a willingness to co-operate with treatment and subsequent testing. The orders last between six months and three years. Order replaced for persons aged 18 or over for offences committed on or after 4 April 2005 by the Community Order (with a drug treatment and testing requirement) introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003

o) Fines

- 1.50 A court may fine an offender for any offence (except murder or treason), although a court may not normally impose a fine for a more serious offence except in conjunction with another penalty. The fine is the most commonly used disposal for offences dealt with by magistrates' courts. Since the implementation of the Criminal Justice Act 1993, courts have been required to fix an amount for the fine which reflects the seriousness of the offence, but which also takes account of the financial circumstances of the offender.
- 1.51 The maximum fine that can be imposed by a magistrates' court varies with the seriousness of the offence. The maximum is currently £5,000 and this 'statutory maximum' applies to almost all offences, which are triable either way. The maximum fines for summary offences are set by reference to a

standard scale (a small number of offences, mainly relating to environmental and planning matters, have special maxima of £20,000). Since 1 October 1992 the maxima have been as follows:

£200	for a level	1	offence
£500	"	2	"
£1,000	"	3	"
£2,500	"	4	"
£5,000	"	5	u

1.52 As examples, taking a motor vehicle without consent is a level 5 offence; careless driving is a level 4 offence; and TV licence evasion is a level 3 offence. The maximum fine that can be imposed on a young person (aged 14–17) is £1,000 and a child (aged under 14) may not be fined more than £250. At the Crown Court, no similar limits apply.

p) Discharges

1.53 A court may discharge a person either absolutely or conditionally where the court takes the view that it is not necessary to impose punishment. An absolute discharge requires nothing from the offender and imposes no restrictions on future conduct. The majority of discharges are conditional discharges where the offender remains liable to punishment for the offence if he is convicted of a further offence within whatever period the court specifies (but not more than three years).

q) Compensation

1.54 In cases involving death, injury, loss or damage, the courts are required to consider making a compensation order, and to give reasons where no such order is made. A compensation order can also be made in addition to any other sentence or order, or can be the only sentence imposed for a particular offence. A magistrates' court can order compensation up to a maximum of £5,000 per offence, but there is no such limit in the Crown Court. However, courts are required to have regard to the means of the offender when deciding whether to make a compensation order and when deciding on its amount. When the defendant makes payments against financial penalties, compensation orders are paid off before fines.

r) Further sentences and orders

1.55 Other punishments are used to a lesser extent. These include binding over orders (either to keep the peace or be of good behaviour), attendance centre orders, confiscation orders, exclusion orders and disqualification from driving. Under attendance centre orders, offenders under 21 may be ordered to take part for a set number of hours in a structured programme of activities on Saturdays. When a defendant stands convicted before the Crown Court of a drug trafficking offence, the Court is required to determine whether he has benefited from drug trafficking at any time, and if so, to make a confiscation order⁶. The amount to be recovered is what the court assesses to be the value of the defendant's proceeds from drug trafficking, or that which can be realised. The courts have general power to penalise a defendant by making an order for the forfeiture of property associated with the offence⁷.

Changes in legislation since 1996

- 2.3 The implementation (in January 1996) of the Criminal Appeals Act 1995 extended the powers of magistrates' courts to re-open cases to rectify mistakes.
- 2.4 The main provisions of the Offensive Weapons Act 1996, implemented on 4 July 1996 were:
 - a) The maximum penalty for the offence of carrying an offensive weapon without lawful authority or reasonable excuse (section 1 of the Prevention of Crime Act 1953) was increased from two to four years.
 - b) The summary offence of having an article with a blade or point in a public place (section 139 of the Criminal Justice Act 1988) was made a triable either way offence with a maximum penalty of two years.
- 2.5 The new criminal offences created by the Protection from Harassment Act 1997 with effect from 16 June 1997 were:
 - a) Putting people in fear of violence (triable either way). This offence carries a maximum penalty of five years immediate custody or unlimited fine or both.
 - b) Offence of harassment (summary offence). This carries a maximum penalty of six months immediate custody or a £5,000 fine or both.
- 2.6 Provisions of the Crime (Sentences) Act 1997 implemented on 1 October 1997 included, for persons aged 18 or over:
 - a) An automatic life sentence for a second serious violent or sexual offence unless there are exceptional circumstances.

- b) A minimum sentence of seven years for an offender convicted for a third time of a class A drug trafficking offence unless the court considers this to be unjust in all the circumstances.
- c) A new section 38A of the Magistrates' Courts Act 1980 extending the circumstances in which a magistrates' court may commit a person convicted of an offence triable either way to the Crown Court for sentence. It was implemented in conjunction with section 49 of the Criminal Procedure and Investigations Act 1996, which involves the magistrates' courts in asking defendants to indicate plea before the mode of trial decision is taken and compels the court to sentence or commit for sentence any defendant who indicates a guilty plea.
- d) A mandatory minimum sentence of three years for third time domestic burglary was implemented in December 1999.
- 2.7 The Crime and Disorder Act 1998, in addition to introducing a range of criminal and civil orders (see Appendix 1), introduced the following nine new offences based on existing offences but carrying higher maximum penalties when there is evidence of a racist motive or racial hostility in connection with the offence:
 - a) Racially aggravated offence of harassment (triable either way) under the Protection from Harassment Act 1997. This offence carries a maximum penalty of two years immediate custody or a £5,000 fine or both.
 - b) Racially aggravated offence of putting people in fear of violence (triable either way) under the Protection from Harassment Act 1997. This offence carries a maximum penalty of seven years immediate custody or a £5,000 fine.
 - c) Racially aggravated offence of intentional harassment, alarm or distress (triable either way) under the Public Order Act 1986. This offence carries a maximum penalty of two years immediate custody or a £5,000 fine or both.
 - d) Racially aggravated offence of fear or provocation of violence (triable either way) under the Public Order Act 1986. This offence carries a maximum penalty of two years immediate custody or a £5,000 fine or both.
 - e) Racially aggravated offence of harassment, alarm or distress (summary offence) under the Public Order Act 1986. This offence carries a maximum penalty of a £2,500 fine.
 - f) Racially aggravated offence of wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm (triable either way) under the Offences Against the Person Act 1861. This offence carries a maximum penalty of seven years immediate custody or a £5,000 fine or both.
 - g) Racially aggravated offence of actual bodily harm (triable either way) under the Offences Against the Person Act 1861. This offence carries a maximum penalty of seven years immediate custody or a £5,000 fine or both.
 - h) Racially aggravated offence of common assault (triable either way). This offence carries a maximum penalty of two years immediate custody or a £5,000 fine or both.
 - i) Racially aggravated offence of criminal damage (triable either way) under the Criminal Damage Act 1971. This offence carries a maximum penalty of 14 years immediate custody or a £5,000 fine or both.
- 2.8 The Criminal Justice and Courts Services Act 2000 is a wide ranging act which creates the new National Probation Service for England and Wales and the Family Court Advisory Service; sets up an integrated statutory system to prevent unsuitable people from working with children, with enforcement by criminal sanctions; renames probation orders, community service orders and combination orders (see Appendix 1, paragraphs 1.40-1.43); makes amendments to the Sex Offenders Act 1997 and increases the penalty for parents who fail to ensure that their children attend school regularly.
- 2.9 Under the Terrorism Act 2000 police retain the powers they have under the current legislation to stop and search, and take other action to combat terrorism and will have strengthened powers to tackle terrorist financing and forfeiture of terrorist assets.
- 2.10 The Anti-terrorism, Crime and Security Act 2001 contains measures to bolster security in the U.K and prosecute terrorists and undermine terrorists and criminal networks. Amongst other things it extends existing racially aggravated offences to cover offences motivated by religious hatred and increases the penalties.
- 2.11 The new provisions in the Criminal Justice and Police Act 2001 meant that from 1 October 2001:

- a) Kerb crawling became an arrestable offence;
- b) Hit and run (where someone is injured) became an arrestable offence;
- c) Importing indecent or obscene material became a serious arrestable offence.
- 2.12 The Vehicles (Crimes) Act 2001 extended the time limit for the summary offence of taking a vehicle without authority from six months after the offence was committed to six months after sufficient evidence comes to the attention of a prosecutor (subject to a 3 year maximum). This measure came into force 1 October 2001.
- 2.13 Although the Copyright, etc. and Trade Marks (Offences and Enforcement) Act 2002 made no changes to the scope of criminal offences in intellectual property law, the maximum penalties were increased to unlimited fines and 10 years imprisonment from 20 October 2002.
- 2.14 Under the Anti-social Behaviour Act 2003 changes to parenting orders were introduced, s18–29, commenced December 2003.
- 2.15 The Aviation (Offences) Act 2003 introduced new offences relating to aviation and increased penalties from two years to two and a half years for endangering an aircraft or a person in an aircraft. Commenced September 2003.
- 2.16 The Fireworks Act 2003 created offences relating to fireworks. The maximum penalty which can be given is 6 months imprisonment or a fine not exceeding level five on the standard scale (currently £5,000) or both. Commenced November 2003.
- 2.17 The Licensing Act 2003 introduced new offences relating to licensing, and some existing offences were amended. Commenced July 2003.
- 2.18 The Criminal Justice Act 2003 brought in means to involve the Crown Prosecution Service in charging decisions and to reform the system for allocating cases to court. It introduced a new presumption against bail in certain circumstances where an offence has been committed while on bail or for defendants charged with an imprisonable offence, not yet in force. The Act aims to ensure that criminal trials are run more efficiently and to ensure a reduction in abuse of the system:
 - a) It will reform the rules on advance disclosure of evidence, with effect from 4 May 2005.
 - b) It will allow for a judge-alone trial in cases involving threats and intimidation of juries, and paves the way for a judge-alone trial in exceptionally long, complex serious fraud cases, not yet in force.
 - c) Rules on evidence will be changed to allow the use of previous convictions where relevant, and to allow the use of reported (hearsay) evidence where there is good reason why the original source cannot be present, or where the judge otherwise considers it would be appropriate, with effect from 4 April 2005.
 - d) A right of appeal for the prosecution against judicial decisions to direct or order an acquittal before the jury has been asked to consider the evidence. This will be introduced to balance the defendant's right of appeal against both conviction and sentence, not yet in force.
 - e) The Act will also make it possible in certain very serious cases for a retrial to take place despite an earlier acquittal if there is new and compelling evidence of an accused's guilt, with effect from 4 April 2005.
- 2.19 The Act provides a sentencing framework that is clearer and more flexible than before:
 - a) The purposes of sentencing of adults are identified in statute for the first time, as punishment, crime reduction, reform and rehabilitation, public protection and reparation.
 - b) The principles of sentencing are set out, including that any previous convictions, where they are recent and relevant, should be regarded as an aggravating factor which will increase the severity of the sentence, with effect from 4 April 2005.
 - c) Through the implementation of section 167 of the act, a new Sentencing Guidelines Council was established on 27 February 2004. This Council and the Sentencing Advisory Panel work together to ensure that sentencing guidelines are produced which encourage consistency in sentencing throughout the courts of England and Wales and support sentencers in their decision making.
 - d) Sentence lengths of over 12 months will be served in full, with half in custody, half in the community and with supervision extended to the end of the sentence rather than the point as previously, with effect from 4 April 2005.
- 2.20 It brought in changes to the sentences available to the courts:
 - a) The various kinds of community orders for adults have been replaced by a single community order with a range of possible requirements, commenced 4 April 2005.

- b) Serious violent and sexual offenders have been given new sentences, which will ensure that they are kept in prison or under supervision for longer periods than previously, with effect from 4 April 2005.
- c) There will be an increase in sentence length for aggravated offences related to disability, sexuality, race or religion, with effect from 4 April 2005.
- d) Some new short custodial sentences have been introduced. These include intermittent custody and a reformed suspended sentence in which offenders have to complete a range of requirements imposed by the court. Intermittent custody was piloted from January 2004 to November 2006 and the new suspended sentence was commenced from 4 April 2005.
- 2.21 The Act also addresses a number of other areas:
 - a) It contains a number of provisions on drug related offending, extending to those aged 14 and above, the provisions to test persons in police detention and at other points in the criminal justice system for specified Class A drugs. It has also reclassified Cannabis as a class C drug, partially introduced on 1 August 2004.
 - b) It has established a five year mandatory minimum custodial sentence for unauthorised possession of a prohibited firearm, with effect from 22 January 2004.
 - c) It has increased the maximum penalty for causing death by dangerous driving from 10 to 14 years, with effect from 27 February 2004.
 - d) In relation to juveniles, the Act extends the use of parenting orders by making them available at an earlier stage and introduces individual support orders, requiring young people with anti-social behaviour orders to undertake education-related activities, partially introduced on 27 February 2004.
- 2.22 The Sexual Offences Act 2003 was brought in from May 2004 in accordance with provision made by the Secretary of State and repealed virtually all of the previous legislation relating to sexual offences. It includes the following main offences, with effect from 1 May 2004:
 - Rape and the evidential and conclusive presumptions about consent regarding adults, covering an individuals ability to make a choice or where violence or threats of violence take place.
 - b) Assault by penetration, committing an offence, causing a person to engage in sexual activity without consent.
 - c) Rape and other offences against children under 13, where the offence is committed intentionally.
 - d) Child sex offences, including causing or inciting a child to engage in sexual activity making it constitute an offence regardless of whether the activity incited actually takes place.
 - e) Causing a child to watch a sexual act and child sex offences committed by children or young persons.
 - f) Re-enacting and amending abuse of position of trust under sections 3 and 4 of the Sexual Offences (Amendment) Act 2000.
 - g) Familial child sex offences, including intension and incitement of the offence.
 - h) Offences against persons with a mental disorder.
 - i) Indecent photographs of children redefining a "child" for the purposes of the Protection of Children Act 1978, as a person under 18 years of age.
 - j) Abuse of children through prostitution and pornography, covering under 18's and under 13's.
 - k) Exploitation of prostitution including trafficking of a person into or out of the UK for sexual exploitation.
 - I) Preparatory offences and sex with an adult relative.
 - m) The act also defines the interpretation of the terms "sexual" and "consent".
- 2.23 The Act also introduced new civil preventative orders:
 - a) Notification orders:

This is a new order which can be made, on application by a chief officer of police, in respect of individuals who have been convicted, cautioned etc. abroad for sexual offences equivalent to the sexual offences listed in Schedule 3 of the 2003 Act. The effect of the order is to make such offenders subject to the notification requirements of Part 2 of the 2003 Act as if they had been convicted, cautioned etc. in the UK of a relevant offence, with effect from 1 May 2004.

b) Sexual offences prevention orders (SOPOs):

This order replaces both the sex offender order and the restraining order. Therefore, a SOPO can be made on application by a chief officer of police in respect of a convicted sex offender or by a court at conviction. The SOPO is also an improvement on the existing orders. A conditional discharge can not be received as punishment for breach of a SOPO, with effect 1 May 2004.

c) Foreign travel orders:

This is a new order which will enable the courts, in certain circumstances and on application by a chief officer of police, to prohibit those convicted of sexual offences against children aged under 16 from travelling overseas where there is evidence that they intend to cause serious sexual harm to children in a foreign country, with effect 1 May 2004.

d) Risk of sexual harm orders (RSHOs):

This is a new order, similar to the SOPO, which aims to restrict the activities of those involved in grooming children for sexual activity. A previous conviction, caution etc. for a sexual offence is *not* a prerequisite in applying for a RSHO, with effect 1 May 2004.

- 2.24 None of the provisions in the act applies retrospectively.
- 2.25 The Domestic Violence, Crime and Victims Act 2004 came into force in July 2005. The measures contained in this bill will strengthen those within the Criminal Justice Act 2003. The key changes include:
 - a) Amending the Family Law Act 1996 by inserting a new section 42A, making the breaching of a non-molestation order an arrestable offence with a maximum sentence length of 5 years, arrestable under the Police and Criminal Evidence Act 1984.
 - b) It will make changes to Criminal Procedure by adding to schedule 1A of The Police and Criminal Evidence Act 1984, making Common Assault an arrestable offence, giving police the power to arrest an individual on suspicion of the offence without an arrest warrant.
 - c) The new offence of causing or allowing the death of a child or vulnerable adult will be limited to incidents where the victim has died from an unlawful act. This offence will apply to members of the household who are not the parents and aged 16 or over, have frequent contact with the victim and fail to take adequate action while aware of the risk.
- 2.26 The Gambling Act 2005 repeals the Betting, Gaming and Lotteries Act 1963 (c.2), the Gaming Act 1968 (c.65) and the Lotteries and Amusements Act 1976 (c. 32). Two comprehensive offences are established: providing facilities for gambling or using premises for gambling, in either case without the appropriate permission. Such permission may come from a licence, permit, or registration granted pursuant to the Act or from an exemption given by the Act. Where authority to provide facilities for gambling is obtained under the Act, it will be subject to varying degrees of regulation, depending on the type of gambling, the means by which it is conducted, and the people by whom and to whom it is offered.
- 2.27 The Terrorism Act 2006 makes it a criminal offence to encourage terrorism, including glorifying terrorism, disseminating terrorist publications, including by extremist bookshops and through internet activity, preparing or planing to commit a terrorist act, or to assist others to do so and to give or receive terrorist training, or to attend a terrorist training camp.
- 2.28 The Immigration, Asylum and Nationality Act 2006:
 - a) restricts appeals for those refused entry to the UK to work or study.
 - b) tackles illegal working through a new civil penalties scheme for employers by introducing fines of up to £2,000 per illegal employee, custodial sentences of up to two-years and unlimited fines for those found knowingly to use or exploit illegal workers
 - c) responds to new security threats by denying asylum to terrorists; improving the ability to strip citizenship from and deport those who pose a serious risk to the UK's interests; and speed up the appeals process in national security deportation cases.
- 2.29 The Identity Cards Act 2006 makes it an offence for a person to be in possession or control of an identity document to which he is not entitled, or of apparatus, articles or materials for making false identity documents; to make provision facilitating the verification of information provided with an application for a passport and includes measures to help against fraud.

Court proceedings

- 3.1 The complexities of the criminal justice system and the constraints on resources in collating and processing data, necessarily limit the amount of information collected routinely and so only the final outcome of proceedings at magistrates' courts and the Crown Court (where applicable) is recorded. The statistics of court proceedings are based on returns made by the police to the Ministry of Justice/Home Office Data Collection Group. Although these include offences where there has been no police involvement, such as those prosecutions instigated by government departments and private organisations and individuals, the reporting of these types of offences is known to be incomplete. Moreover, it is thought that for some police force areas, the reporting of court proceedings, in particular those relating to motoring offences (see paragraph 3.4) and to TV Licence evasion (see also paragraph 3.4), may also be less than complete; the extent of under-reporting may vary from year to year and this could be responsible in part for the annual variations in the published statistics.
- 3.2 For the first time, all the magistrates' courts data for 2006 were received on magnetic tape or disk either from magistrates' courts directly or via police computer systems. From 1st July 1995, the Ministry of Justice (formerly Home Office) has received all its data on trials and sentences at the Crown Court directly from HM Court Service's CREST computer system. For trials completed after this date, information can now be analysed by the final plea recorded at the completion of the trial.
- 3.3 West Mercia police in 1996, Lancashire police in 1999, Norfolk police in 2000 and Humberside, Merseyside, Northumbria, Staffordshire and Surrey police in 2001 were not able to supply all the returns for summary proceedings within the required timescale. In addition there were two further problems which affected 2000 magistrates' courts data. Staffordshire police were only able to supply a nine per cent sample of data covering one full week in each quarter of 2000. This data has been used to estimate the total number of defendants for which magistrates' court proceedings were completed in that area. Hence all Staffordshire figures for 2000 are estimates and the England and Wales figures for 2000 have been constructed using those estimates. Also, for the first time, problems were encountered with the electronic submission of data directly from the courts. Shortfalls in summary motoring offences were discovered for Northamptonshire from June 2000 onwards. In 2001, a single month's shortfall or part thereof was found for indictable and summary motoring offences at Humberside, Merseyside, Staffordshire and Surrey police. In 2002, part shortfalls were noted for Merseyside over all offences groups for a five-month period, together with summary motoring and/or summary non-motoring for Gwent, Norfolk and Northamptonshire. The estimates in the table below reflect those shortfalls. In 2003 there were shortfalls for South Yorkshire and Thames Valley for summary non-motoring offences. For summary motoring offences the main shortfalls were for Suffolk and Northamptonshire. Estimates for these and for other minor shortfalls are reflected in the table. No significant shortfalls were identified in 2004, 2005 or 2006, although Northamptonshire recorded no community sentences for juveniles made at magistrates' courts between 2002 and late in 2006.
- 3.4 The following estimates have been constructed on the short-falls in the number proceeded against and the number convicted (sentenced) in magistrates' courts for each year from 1996, arising from the circumstances described in the previous two paragraphs:

- 3.5 The tables relate to sentencing resulting from court proceedings completed in the years shown. An offender will appear more than once in the tables if sentencing proceedings were completed against that offender on more than one occasion during the year. In the statistics, the term 'other offenders' is used to denote companies and other businesses, local authorities, public bodies, etc.
- 3.6 The offence breakdown in the tables covers indictable offences and summary offences. The former term includes both indictable only and triable either way offences. Offenders are recorded only once for each set of court proceedings resulting in sentencing, against the principal offence involved (see next paragraph).
- 3.7 Where sentencing involves more than one offence, the tables record the principal offence. The basis for the selection of the principal offence is as follows:
 - a) Where a defendant is found guilty of one offence and acquitted of another, the offence selected is the one for which the defendant is found guilty;
 - b) Where a defendant is found guilty of two or more offences, the offence selected is the one for which the heaviest sentence is imposed;
 - c) Where the same disposal is imposed for two or more offences, the offence selected is the one for which the statutory maximum penalty is the most severe.
- 3.8 Changes in the maximum penalties and in whether offences with different maximum penalties are separately coded may affect the selection of the principal offence at stage (c) above.
- 3.9 The offence shown in the tables as the one for which the court took its final decision, is not necessarily the same as the offence for which the defendant was initially proceeded against, for example the court may accept a plea of guilty on a lesser charge. Unless otherwise stated, the sentence shown is the most severe sentence or order given for the principal offence (i.e. the principal sentence); thus, secondary sentences given for the principal offence and sentences for non-principal offences are not counted in the tables, with the exception of those on compensation, confiscation and forfeiture where one of the first three disposals may be counted.
- 3.10 A defendant appearing at the Crown Court on the same occasion both for trial and for sentence after summary conviction is counted twice in the tables.

Ethnic Monitoring

- 3.11 Section 95 of the Criminal Justice Act 1991 requires the Secretary of State to publish such information as he considers expedient in order to enable those involved in the criminal justice system to become aware of the financial implications of their decisions, or to avoid improper discrimination on grounds of race, sex or any other improper grounds. The Ministry of Justice (formerly Home Office) published a series of documents from 1992 onwards on the issue of race within the Criminal Justice system. The publication brings together both points relating to the Government's policy on race as well as statistical information.
- 3.12 The latest publication, 'Statistics on Race and the Criminal Justice System, 2006', presents data, broken down by ethnicity, on the Police and Criminal Evidence Act (PACE) stops and searches, victims and homicide, arrests and cautions, prosecutions and sentencing, the prison population, racist incidents, police complaints and employment by criminal justice agencies. Concluding comments

3.13 Every effort is made to ensure that the figures presented in this publication are accurate and complete. However, it is important to note that these data have been extracted by the courts and police forces from a variety of administrative data systems and the detail supplied to RDS-OCJR is therefore subject to the inaccuracies inherent in any large-scale recording system. Although some figures in this volume are shown to the last digit, the figures are not necessarily accurate to the last digit shown. It is important that users of the data take these limitations into account when using and interpreting the data presented in this volume. Where the statistics shown are rounded, the components may not add exactly to the rounded total because they have been rounded independently.
