## Monthly children entering detention table

### Background

The Home Office have published management information on adults and children entering detention held solely under Immigration Act powers going back to Quarter 1 2009. They have been published quarterly and are available in the Control of Immigration: Quarterly Statistical Summary, on the Home Office's Research, Development and Statistics website at:

The latest edition current to this publication is the Control of Immigration: Quarterly Statistical Summary, United Kingdom, July – September 2010 published on the 25th November 2010. Statistics on people entering detention are contained in Table 3.4.

All the statistics on detention are published quarterly alongside other statistics related to migration, to allow a more coherent picture of immigration statistics, cover a wide range of data and avoid confusion caused by frequent publications which may give conflicting messages. However, there has been a recent increase in public and parliamentary interest in the numbers of children entering detention, held solely under Immigration Act powers, as evidenced for example by a greater number of Parliamentary Questions and Freedom of Information Act requests on this subject. In order to service this latest interest and a desire for more frequent information it was decided to publish management information monthly on children entering detention, held solely under Immigration Act powers, as official statistics. The intention is to publish this more frequent information whilst the government's review of the current measures for the detention of children for immigration purposes is ongoing. After which consideration will be given to future publication.

### Notes on the table provided

The figures are based on management information and are not subject to the detailed checks that apply for National Statistics. They may be revised in the subsequent Quarterly Control of Immigration publications following more detailed quality assurance. Therefore they should be seen as provisional and to be superseded by the quarterly figures on children entering detention which will continue to be published in the Quarterly Control of Immigration publication.
